BELLEVILLE IS WORRYING
39th Battalion Should Be Mobilized
in Kingston.

Belleville received a shock on Fri-
 day when an order was issued from
 headquarters of No. 3 military divi-
 sion, Kingston, to stop the work
 of clearing out the canning factory,
 which the militia department re-
 quired for the mobilization of the 39th
 battalion of the third contingent,
 the military men of Belleville
 thought this meant that the battali-
 on would be mobilized at Kingston
 when the 21st left here, in order to
 give fitting quarters in Belleville.

However, Belleville's fears may be
 allayed. Col. T. D. R. Hemming,
 when asked by the Whig, stated
 that he had issued the order refer-
 red to, as he had no information
 from Ottawa that the militia depart-
 ment would pay the expense of re-
 moving the canning factory goods.
 He did not think the militia depart-
 ment had any intention of mobiliz-
 ing this battalion here.

A MILITARY CARNIVAL

AN INTERESTING PROGRAMME
 WILL BE ARRANGED.

Invitations To Be Extended To All
 Outside Relatives and Friends Of
 The Overseas Battalion — Some
 Suggestions Made.

Regarding the Military Carnival
 for the week of Feb. 22nd to 27th,
 it is proposed to provide entertain-
 ment for the visitors to the city in
 the way of presentation and blessing
 of colours, grand military parade of
 21st Battalion which will be interest-
 ing to the friends and relatives of
 the men of the battalion, and field
 day of sports, open to men of the
 21st Battalion with cash prizes.

It is suggested that Monday be given
 to the reception and meeting of
 relatives of the troops; Monday after-
 noon or night the presentation of
 the colours; Tuesday morning the
 military turnout; Tuesday afternoon
 military sports; Tuesday evening
 grand patriotic concert in the Opera
 House, proceeds to go to providing
 a special package to each member
 of the regiment when leaving the
 city or grand display of fireworks
 Wednesday is still an open question.

It is quite probable that the
 G.T.R., C.P.R. and C.N.R. will allow
 a special one-day excursion rate
 good going Monday, Tuesday and
 Wednesday to return up to Friday
 (the 26th). These rates will extend
 from Bowmanville on the west to
 Coleau on the east and also Lindsay
 and Ottawa and intermediate sta-
 tions.

Some 3,000 printed post cards will
 be supplied to the members of the
 battalion, which they can sign and
 address and send out to their friends,
 inviting them to the city to bid fare-
 well before leaving for overseas.

The Port Hope members of the 21st
 Battalion will forward tickets to any
 member of the Daughters of the
 Empire in that city.

It is quite probable, this being
 the last opportunity of relatives
 seeing before the troops leave that
 there will be a very large number of
 visitors in the city, in fact more
 than the hotels can accommodate
 and it is suggested that those hav-
 ing rooms to rent will make known
 the fact to the committee in some
 way. Citizens and merchants are
 asked to cooperate for this week, and
 make it the biggest in the history of

the city.

A mass meeting has been
 called for Monday the 8th inst. in
 the council chamber, and citizens are
 specially urged to turn out in large
 numbers.
