MADE IN CANADA

VICTORY ON THE BZURA

WAS GIGANTIC IN THE THREE-DAY ACTION

The Germans Were Forced To Retire With Heavy Losses—The Attacks By Both Sides Were Feroocious.

Petrograd, Feb. 8.—The latest reports from the front in Russian Poland bring some brief details of the important Russian victory on the Bzura River.

While the Germans, with three-quarters of their forces along the Bzura continued to hammer at the Russian line, the Russians seized this opportunity to throw their force across the Bzura at Kamion, near the junction of the Bzura with the Vistula, and captured the German fortified position at this place.

Near Bolimaw, the Germans were unrelenting in their attacks, and the Russians countered with equal ferocity.

The German forces repeatedly made use of motor cars, on which machine guns and quick-firing guns had been set up.

Russian military authorities are of the opinion that the desperate move evidenced by the Germans in Russian Poland is a shield for the removal of forces towards the western front, and they compare these attacks with those delivered by Gen. Von Hindenberg.

MORE GERMAN WARSHIPS

LATEST WAR TIDINGS

During the past two weeks the names of 109 officers have been added to the official British casualty list, bringing the total of British officers killed, wounded and missing up to 4,453.

Natalie Tychinski, a high school girl of Kiev, has received the decoration of the Order of St. George for distinguished service at the front.

Under a heavy fire at Opotow, in the campaign against the Austrians, the girl carried ammunition to the Russian trenches and attended wounded men. She was wounded twice.

Indignation is expressed by the Swedish press because of Germany's proclamation relative to a blockade of the British Isles.

The German admiralty's proclamation including in the war zone the waters surrounding the British Isles has provoked an outburst of indignation in the French press, although it is held generally as an indication that Germany is beginning to find her situation desperate.

The French torpedo boat 215 has been sunk off Nieuport, Belgium.

It is reported that German aeroplanes have succeeded in throwing some bombs on the French town of Bailleul, nine miles east of Hazebrouck and near the Belgian frontier.

German army surgeons conferred at Lille relative to serious advances or setbacks amongst the German troops.

In Belgium Sunday was very quiet. The British took a brick yard from the enemy east of Cuinchy. From Arras to Rheims the allies had the advantage of an artillery fight.

Artillery combats are handicapped by heavy fogs between Arras and Valenciennes.

Berlin official statement admits that the allies penetrated the German trenches south of Labasse.

The German force invading Cape Colony has again been defeated by Botha's men.

It is believed in Rome that 110,000 Turks are in the expedition attacking the Suez canal.

It is believed that the withdrawal of the Germans from Warsaw has begun. Russians have crumpled up part of the line.

Application has been made by the faculty of medicine for the convocation and the university authorities will likely accede to the request.

Was German Kiltarist. New York, Feb. 8.—Mrs. Mary Kuhn told Recorder Eggers in the West New York police court that her German husband beat the life out of her every time the sarring hoists of his countrymen met with a reverse in their encounters with the allies.
