Berlin, Feb. 9 (via The Hague to London).-The naval measures of Germany against British commerce are in no sense a blockade. No hostile action against neutral shipping is con-

German submarines and will endeavor by every means in their power to avoid sinking American or other neutral ships, and will take every precaution to avoid a mistake be-

The proclamation of the waters around Great Britain as a war zone, like similar British measures which were taken as a precedent, is designed to warn neutrals that a ship venturing into the naval field of operations exposes itself, in the same fashion as a civilian wanders on a land battlefield, to the risk of being struck by a

What Proclamation Means.

The above may be taken as the correct interpretation placed upon the German proclamation in competent circles in Berlin. It was stated today that it might be safely asserted that the Germans have no intention of sinking an American ship unless is carrying contraband of war and then only if her crew can be given the possibility of escape.

It was added, however, that war measures will be carried out against British trade with all possible severity in order "to give England a taste of

The warning to neutral shipping, it was asserted, was considered as particularly needed, in view of the reported order to British ships to hoist a neutral flag whenever they are in danger, an order which, if adhered to, it was stated, would make it difficult for a German war ship to discrimin ate between neutral and hostile ship

The Estimates Total Up to \$190,329,352

Ottawa, Feb. 9 .- The main estimates for the coming fiscal year, tabled in the commons late last night, provide for a total appropriation of \$190,329,352, a decrease of \$17,789,-320 as compared with the total amount voted in both main and supplementary estimates last session. But with supplementary estimates still to come, this session's appropriations will probably equal, if not surpass those of last year, exclusive altogether of the \$100,000,000 voted for war. Of the increased votes, \$236,000 goes agriculture, including \$100,000 nore in aid to the provinces for agricultural instruction and \$150,000 more for the development of the live stock

Very few new public works of any kind are being undertaken, but funds are provided in every case to continue work already begun or promised.
