





Plain Muffins. One egg well beaten, a tablespoonful of butter and a tablespoonful of sugar, with a teaspoonful of salt, all beaten until very light. One cup of milk, three of sifted flour and three tablespoonfuls of baking powder One half graham and one half rye meal may be used instead of whea flour or two cups of cornmeal and one of flour. Drop on well-greased patty pans and bake twenty minutes in a rather quick oven or bake on ; griddle in muffin rings.
