SAWMILL WAS BURNED

S. ANGLIN & CO. SUFFERED A LOSS TUESDAY AFTERNOON.

Blaze Likely Originated From Spontaneous Combustion—The Damage Will Amount to \$15,000.

At 12.45 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, fire broke out in the saw mill of S. Anglin & Co.'s factory, destroying the large building containing the planing and sawing departments, as well as the mica assortment room. This building, according to Mr. Anglin's statement, was valued at \$15,000 and was partly covered by insurance.
The origin of the fire is not known, but it is thought that spontaneous combustion started in a pile of saw dust collected underneath the saw mill. The blaze was first noticed by Samuel Anglin. A telephone call was sent into both fire stations, and five streams of hose were shortly playing upon the roaring furnace of flames. However, the flames had gained such headway that the whole building was, in a short time, a mass of burning embers. The heat from it was terrific, and the water and steam pipes were twisted and warped into all shapes. The intense heat had a tendency to cause the burning department to take fire, but Chief Anglin's strong and his men soon checked this and prevented the fire from spreading to the adjacent buildings.
The fire was confined to the one building, and much praise must be given the fire-fighters for the splendid work they rendered. Many of the callmen turned in and assisted.
The 1.08 p.m. G.T.R. train could not make its way to the outer station, on account of the hose lying across the tracks. As a means of getting there in time, several automobiles and sleighs were chartered by the company to transfer some forty passengers.

Juvenile Hockey League.

The executive of the Juvenile City Hockey League met Monday evening and thrashed out three protests. The first dealt with a game played between Dry Bones and Wanderers. The match was awarded to the latter because S. McGill, of the Dry Bones line-up, was found to be over age. The second protest dealt with a game played between Victorias and Dry Bones. The match was cancelled and a sudden-death game ordered to be played by these two aggregations. The Wanderers and Victorias match next occupied the attention of the executive. Victorias had a player, Gordon Young, on its line-up, who was over age, and he was suspended from the league.
The executive also decided to end once for all this protesting, and raised the fee from 25c. to \$1. The executive is also looking into the matter of certain players who are suspected of being over age. Two in particular who it is thought are violating this rule, will shortly be brought to account.
