### RECRUITS FOR R.C.H.A.

#### FOURTEEN-YEAR-OLD BURGALAR IS GOING OVERSEAS.

Officers Who Are Coming to Kingston To Take the Third Royal School of Artillery Course at Tete de Pont Barracks.

Already thirty-seven recruits have been obtained for the R.C.H.A., of the total number of 104 who are required. The pay for these men is much better than in other branches of the militia. Fifty cents a day is paid to every man. To this is added forty cents a day during the war. If the recruit passes the usual examinations he receives fifteen cents a day for a first-class certificate, or ten cents a day for a second class certificate. The sum of \$1.70 is put to the man's credit for a clothing allowance, and if he is at all careful of his uniforms, he can save some of this. Beside this amount, at the end of one year he receives two cents a day, at the end of the second year three cents a day, and at the end of the third year four cents a day. The requirements of height are five feet three inches for drivers, and five feet seven inches for gunners. The men must be of average intelligence.

Q.M.S. Brown left at noon on Tuesday for Toronto, Hamilton and London, and Sergt. Major Peppiatt, for Montreal. They will examine the volunteers at those places for the R.C.H.A., and, if they are found acceptable, arrange for their transportation.

The youngest man going overseas from Kingston is Bugler William Peppiatt, son of Sergt. Major Peppiatt, of the R.C.H.A. The bugler is only ten years of age, but like his father is a born soldier, and will be a credit to the 22nd Battery, of which he is a member.

Two of the members of the 22nd Battery are men who came a long distance to volunteer for overseas service. Sergt. Gregory, who is an ex-R.C.H.A. man, and served in India and other campaigns, came from the western part of the dominion. Sergt. Major Cooke, of the R.C.A., was with the Canadian Garrison Artillery at Quebec, and later at Woolwich, and when war was declared came from Buenos Ayres.

Lieut. G. S. Bowerbank and Lieut. W. K. Wilgress, who have been attached to the 21st, have been absorbed into the establishment.

A well-attended concert was given in the right hall recreation rooms on Monday evening. Both the pipers and the brass bands of the battalion gave selections. Mr. Forbes, warden of Lunenburg county, gave exhibitions of card tricks. Ptes. Farmer and Smythe sang a duet, Pte. Maribag, Pte. Robins and Pte. Fitzgerald gave solos, and Corpl. Constance gave a comic singing and dancing act. Every number was heartily enjoyed by the audience and will likely be repeated in the left hall recreation rooms on Friday. During the evening, Lieut.-Col. W. S. Hughes and Lieut. G. S. Bowerbank gave short addresses.

The establishment of the 22nd Battery is now 157 men, four guns, eight wagons and seventy-two horses. Major Reardon, Capt. Fee and Lieuts. MacAulay and Casella are the officers of the battery, which will leave shortly for Halifax.

When the 22nd Battery goes overseas it will not take any horses from here. The horses it has been using on the four gubs and eight wagons will be kept here for the use of the R.C.H.A.

Major Hamilton, A.D.S., and T. has received orders to take on ten drivers for Army Service Corps transports to the front, the men to leave the city the early part of next week. As this is an excellent opportunity to get to the front quickly, there will be no trouble in getting the necessary number.

Sergt.-Major Hughes was in Montreal over the week-end.

The new consignment of shoes is being issued. The new shoes are a lower heel, and is a wider last than the old issue. The leather is of a better quality.

The choir of Queen Street Methodist Church will give an entertainment to the soldiers in the militia Y.M.C.A. hall Tuesday night.

It is likely that the 21st Battalion will take a route march to Gananogue on Wednesday. As in previous marches a plan of attack or defense is worked out.

### COLORS PRESENTED TO 22ND BATTERY

Colors Were Consecrated by Bishop Bidwell, Dean Starr and Capt. Kidd.

The 22nd Battery, second Canadian overseas contingent, was, on Tuesday afternoon, presented with the king's colors, the gift of the Kingston Veterans' Association. The ceremony took place in the armouries at two o'clock, and a large gathering was in attendance.

The colors were accompanied by Bishop Bidwell, Dean Starr and Capt. W. B. Kidd. The presentation was made by Major E. B. Sutherland. The 21st Battalion paraded to the armouries at 1.45 p.m., and the bugle and pipers bands played selections as the 22nd Battery marched in. At two o'clock ten members of the Kingston Veterans' Association escorted the flag from the College Book Store to the armouries, marching in to music supplied by the R.C.H.A. band.

After the consecration ceremony the R.C.H.A. band played the "Silver Trumpet" and the ansof made the presentation. Dr. J. G. Evans, in the name of the Kingston Veterans' Association, gave a short address, which was replied to by Major Reardon, O.C. of the 22nd Battery. Col. T. D. R. Hemming, O.C. 3rd division, Lieut.-Col. Petreau, acting commandant of the Royal Military College, and Lieut.-Col. W. S. Hughes, of the 21st Battalion, C.E.F., gave short addresses.

The colors will be placed, by request of the association, in Westminister Abbey while the battery is at the front, and when it returns to Kingston will be placed in St. George's cathedral.

There will be many other striking features which will provide ample amusement for the crowds who are expected to take advantage of the special railway rate offered at single fare, from Ottawa, Peterboro, Port Hope, Belleville, Brockville and other points.

To make the carnival the huge success it will be, the citizens have only to urge their friends outside the city to take advantage of the hitherto unprecedented low rate offered by the railway companies.
