

PRAISED 22ND BATTERY AS FINE BODY OF MEN

Addresses in Connection With Presentation of Colors.

MAJOR REIRDON HOPES TO BRING THE COLORS BACK UNSULLIED.

Battery Not Permitted To Carry Flag On Field, But Esteemed It a Great Honor To Be Presented With One.

With most impressive ceremony in the armouries on Tuesday afternoon, the 22nd Battery, which is leaving in the near future for the front, was presented with the king's colors by Mayor Sutherland on behalf of the Kingston Veterans' association. There was a large crowd of citizens on the balcony and over 1,000 soldiers in the building. The 22nd

Battery, under Major Reiridon, occupied the south end, and the 21st Battalion under Lieut-Col. W. S. Hughes, occupied the north end. About forty members of the Veterans' Association were present. The Royal Military College was represented by Lieut-Col. Perreau, acting commandant. The 21st Battalion pipers and bugle bands and the R.C.H.A., band furnished music during the ceremony. The colors were escorted by an armed escort and the veterans, from the College Book store to the armouries where they were consecrated by Bishop Bidwell, Dean Starr and Capt. the Rev. W. E. Kidd. Mayor Sutherland in making the presentation spoke a few words congratulating the men of the battery upon their conduct while in the city, and while the citizens were sorry to lose them, they were sure that Kingston would be honorably represented at the front by such a fine battery.

Dr. J. G. Evans, secretary of the

Veterans' Association, in a short address spoke of the sacrifices the Veterans had made in order to be able to present the colors to the battery, but the result was worth the effort. He wished the battery Godspeed on and was sure that the reports of its work on the firing line would be a credit to Major Reiridon, the other officers of the battery and the men.

In reply to the two preceding speakers, Major Reiridon said that it was a pleasure to have the honor to command such a fine body of men; and in the name of the battery he expressed appreciation of the honor that was being done by the veterans in presenting the colors. He would do his best while in command of the battery to be a credit to the city and bring the colors home without a mark against them.

Col. T.D.R. Hemming said that although it was against military regulations for a battery to carry a flag on the field, the honor of being presented with one was a great honor to the 22nd Battery, but that honor was deserved while in the city they had shown themselves to be a fine body and a credit to the 3rd division.

Lieut-Col. Perreau said that some of the honor that had been given to the battery should be shared with the Royal Military College, as two graduates, Lieuts. Macaulay and Casson, were officers of the battery. He appreciated the honor of being asked to speak at this presentation, as it gave him an opportunity to wish the battery Godspeed on its way.

Lieut-Col. W. S. Hughes, said that he hoped to be in the same brigade as the 22nd Battery when it got to the other side as he would consider it an honor to have such a splendid battery as part of the brigade with the 21st Battalion. After three months here, the officers of the battalion and the battery had become great friends, and the members of the battalion would miss the 22nd Battery very much. He was sure that their work overseas would be a credit to not only Kingston but the Dominion.

WAR BULLETINS.

In a special report on Tuesday Gen. French declares the British have made further progress along the banks of the Labasse Canal.

Confirmation was made at Paris on Tuesday that the British took a valuable strategic position near Ypres on Sunday last.

In his official report, Sir John French describes the Princess Pats as a magnificent set of men who did gallant work in the trenches.

Forty British and French aeroplanes attacked German positions in Belgium doing serious damage to fortifications and submarine bases.

The German offensive on British positions has become furious and terrific.

Britain has declined all German offers of compromise in blockading operations, and declares now is the time to speedily end the war.

The French have captured two miles of trenches in the Champagne district and made many prisoners.

AUSTRIANS LOSE HEART

And Large Numbers Surrender in Carpathians.

Petrograd, Feb. 17.—The difficulties of the Germans are increasing daily, notwithstanding their apparent progress in East Prussia. Although large masses of Germans have been sent to strengthen the Austrians in the Carpathians, only two important passes are held by them on the southern mountains, while the north-western portion of the range is in Russian hands. It is impossible under existing circumstances for a considerable body of the enemy's force to get through. Every day of delay spells disaster to the Germans, who are firmly held in the Carpathian district.

The Austrians, losing heart, are surrendering in large numbers. In the early days of the campaign attempts were made to minimize a similar circumstances by the statement that the prisoners disaffected were Slavs, possessing no pro-German sentiment, but now, prisoners coming in are mostly members of Magyar regiments.

FLEW OVER STRASSBURG.

French Airman's Visit Caused Something Like Panic. Geneva, Feb. 17.—There was something of a panic at Strassburg yesterday when the city was visited by French aviators. There were two pilots. After circling the town they flew over it and close to the famous cathedral, but no bombs were dropped.

Yesterday three German aeroplanes flew over Belfort, but were chased away by French aviators. At Thann, where a fierce artillery duel between the French and Germans continues with vigor, the German artillery fire has completely destroyed an ancient Gothic church.

TURK PRISONERS IN CAIRO.

Populace Impressed by Hundreds Marching Through Streets. Cairo, Feb. 17.—Six hundred Turkish prisoners of war were marched yesterday through some of the principal streets of Cairo under an escort with fixed bayonets. They were being removed to a camp in the desert south of the city. The majority were in khaki, but some wore grey uniforms of German design and others were in Bedouin costumes. The parade made a deep impression upon the populace.

WORK OF NAVAL RAIDERS.

British Aviators Had Fairly Profitable Trip.

Amsterdam, via London, Feb. 17.—The Handelsblad's Stius correspondent, in a despatch concerning the raid last week of 34 British aviators over portions of Northern Belgium, says that at Ostend only the sheds of the sea railway station were badly damaged and that the Hotel Terminus near the station was slightly damaged. The De Smet De Nayer Bridge suffered heavily and all communication with the sea station was broken.

At Blankenberge the correspondent says the station and the railway were totally destroyed. At Zebrugge he adds, the central electric works and a factory were destroyed and the bridges there could not be worked owing to a lack of electricity. A Zepplin shed with all its contents was destroyed, the correspondent adds.

MORE EVIDENCE OF BLUFF.

Germany Not To Expect Sudden Coup Feb. 18th.

London, Feb. 17.—The naval authorities at Berlin, according to a Copenhagen despatch to the Exchange Telegraph company, have informed the press and the public that they should not expect a sudden German coup on the seas February 18th. The date set for the blockade. This date, it is explained, was fixed up more for the purpose of warning neutrals than as a moment for a concerted blow to shipping.

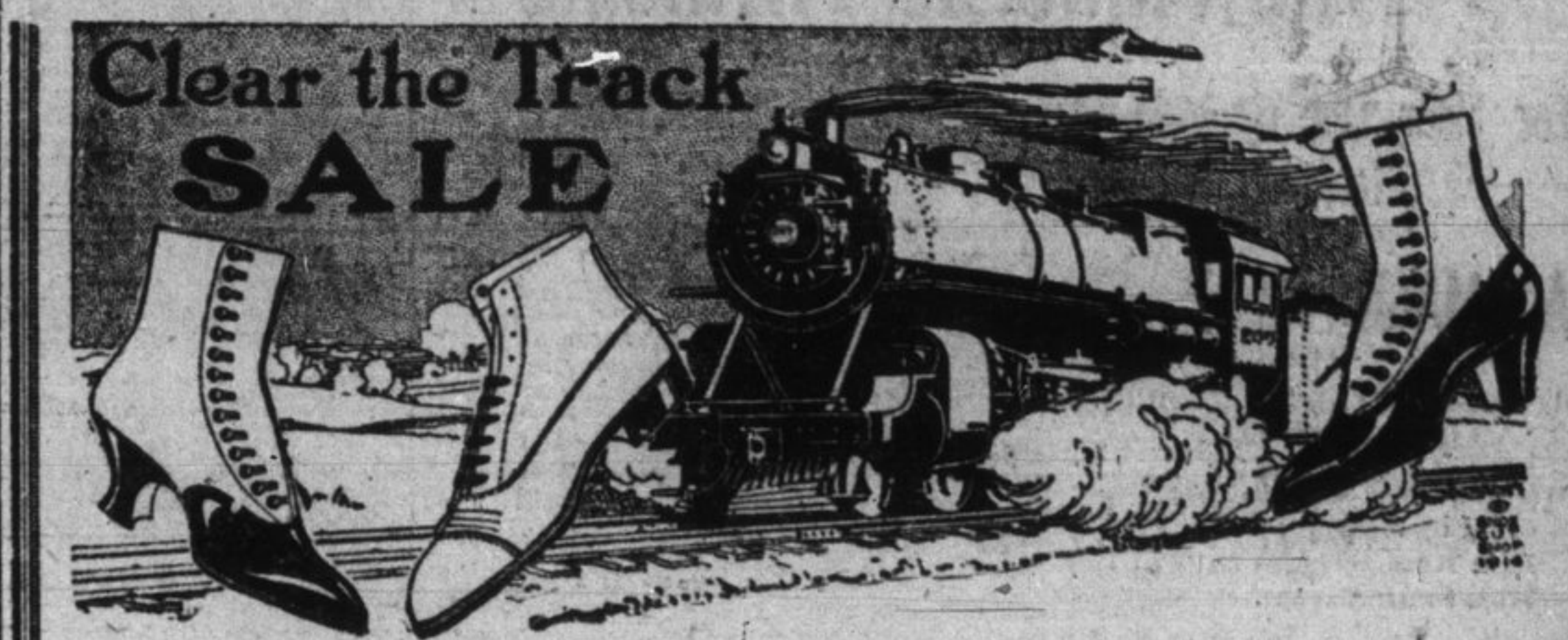

VISIT TO SISTER JULIE.

Frenchwoman Who Saved Wounded By Confronting Germans.

Paris, Feb. 17.—The Reclaire reports from the Journal de Geneve alleged details of a visit to Gerbillon, the Meuthé et Moselle township of 2,000 inhabitants, where Sister Julie saved wounded French soldiers by bravely confronting the Germans, who sacked the town, shot 136 civilians and burned everything except a little group of ten houses, surrounding that which shelters Sister Julie's wounded.

After describing, from information furnished by survivors, how "the German soldiers went, lamenting the brutality of the orders they dared not disobey," the correspondent tells of his visit to Sister Julie, whom he found cutting clothes for refugees children out of German overcoats. "This stuff serves the useful purpose, after all," she said, as she shaped a tiny pair of trousers.

"The best of all," says the correspondent, recounting his conversation with her, "was her reply when I said that our troops would repay the Germans with interest. She answered: 'I pray we may never do what they have done here.'"
