

THE RUSSIANS AGAIN ARE QUITE SUCCESSFUL

Doing Good Service Along Northern Battle Line.

WAR OFFICE CLAIMS

FIGHTING ON VISTULA IS INCREASING IN VIOLENCE.

Not Much Ground Gained by Either Side—Germans Were Repulsed With Heavy Losses—Bayonet Charges Made to Finally Check Advances.

Petrograd, Feb. 18.—Distinct successes over the Germans and Austro-German forces in Galicia, the Carpathians and at isolated points along the northern battle line, are claimed by the war office to-day. It declares that the fighting on the left bank of the Vistula is continually increasing in violence, but that neither side has been able to gain any ground.

North of Niemen, where the Russian forces have taken up new positions, exchanges have been confined to cavalry patrol encounters with light damage and the balance of the success roated with the Russians.

In Galicia, the Germans attacked in force along the front from Khava to Vykorotch and further east but were repulsed with heavy losses. In Lubne-Sudzhyn region another German attack was repulsed and 1,400 prisoners and three machine guns were captured.

In the Carpathians, at Vyszkov Pass, the Germans have delivered a series of impetuous assaults, pushing forward in the direction of the main Russian positions commanding the pass. They were finally checked by a series of bayonet charges, one entire battalion being either killed or taken prisoners.

A young woman, aged eighteen years, taken in charge a few days ago by W. H. Wylie, inspector for the Children's Aid Society, was, on Thursday afternoon, sent to a good home in the country. She ran away from a home in the country one day last week. Mr. Wylie got on her track, and as a result has had her detained at police headquarters. On Wednesday he made arrangements for her to go to a home and she left via the stage route, stating that she would stay at the home and not come to the city again.

Is Improving Nicely.

Cadet Charles Winters of the Royal Military College and accidentally shot while cleaning his rifle, on Tuesday evening, was reported to be doing nicely on Thursday morning. Cadet Winters is the son of Col. Winters, attached to the Army Service Corps in Bermuda. A court of inquiry has been forwarded to Ottawa dealing with the shooting and in a day or so the result of it will be known.

BRITAIN READY

For the Threatened Action by German Submarines.

CONFIDENCE IN NAVY

TO PREVENT INTERFERENCE WITH LINERS OR FOODSHIPS.

Germany Said to Have 100 Submarines—Bets Made in London That Not a Vessel Would Be Sunk on Thursday.

London, Feb. 18.—"Der tag" dawned cold, wet and gloom, throughout the British Isles. A driving rain swept over the various harbors and checked outside dock labor, but there was no halting of sailings anywhere. British imperturbability was utterly unaffected by the inauguration of the German submarine blockade. The most supreme confidence in the navy to prevent any interference with liners or food ships is felt.

Private advices from Berlin from really dependable sources declare that Germany has not less than 100 submarines available for service in the war since to-day. Ever since last August when many waters were laid at three to one that not a single merchantman would be sunk before midnight to-night. There has been absolutely no interruption to the channel service or the general coast-wise shipping.

Up till noon to-day, London time, no sinking of ships had been reported. The liner Adriatic and other ships from the United States reached port safely this morning.

The Noose Is Around Germany's Neck

London, Feb. 18.—The Daily News says: "Germany, through its inspired press bureau, is sending abroad a fantastic story to the effect that this country has laid a plot to destroy neutral shipping on Feb. 18th, in order to bring Germany into trouble with the neutral powers. The circulation of such a wild invention is one more evidence of that strange mentality of Germany, which is the war. It shows that Germany, having most surprising revelation of the ing announced a policy which is an equal menace to British and neutral shipping, is in deadly fear of the consequences of that policy. Beaten off the seas, Germany cannot and will not be permitted to turn pirate and go unwhipped.

"We may rest assured that, to-day, will not find the admiralty unprepared with means of dealing with the new danger. We have no doubt the corky will be able to destroy many innocent lives, but whatever the destruction it will recoil with disastrous consequences on Germany. It will embolden her with neutrals and will certainly be followed by stern measures from this country. The British navy has thrown the noose around the neck of Germany and the more valiantly she struggles against it, the more fatal will become the pressure."

FOR PUBLIC GOOD.

Leaves Fortune for Cancer Research Work.

New York, Feb. 18.—Emil C. Bondy, who died February 7th, leaving a large estate, bequeathed more than \$200,000 for public and charitable purposes. His will was filed to-day for probate.

The trustees of Columbia University are left \$100,000, the income to be used primarily for cancer research work and the publication of the results of such researches. Should the progress of science make the possession of further researches in regard to cancer at any time unnecessary, the will provides the income may be used by the trustees as they may determine it in prosecution of other researches in medicine and surgery.

TO ESTABLISH BIG CREDIT.

Fund May Be Created for Britain at New York.

New York, Feb. 18.—Wall street is looking for the taking of steps soon for the establishment here of a \$100,000,000 credit for Great Britain.

It is not expected that any formal steps in the matter of establishing a credit here out of which England can pay for goods bought in this market will be taken except at the request of Great Britain, but it was made clear to-day that bankers were looking for such a request.

KEEP BRASS FROM GERMANS.

Remove All Buttons Sent to French Prisoners.

Paris, Feb. 18.—An official notice, just issued, warns the public that in sending clothing to French prisoners in Germany all buttons, especially brass ones, must be cut off. Orders have been issued that hereafter all soldiers of France shall receive half a litre of wine each day. This order follows the announcement that every double the quantity of wine on hand that was believed in storage.

RUSSIAN PRISONERS BRANDED.

Germans Said to Use Red Hot Irons On Them.

Paris, Feb. 18.—A Petrograd despatch to the Journal says: "It is reported that the Russian general staff has received information that the Germans are branding Russian prisoners with red hot irons to prevent wholesale escapes from detention camps. The words, 'Prisoner of war, 1914,' are said to be stamped upon the forehead of each captive."

Give Letters To Detectives.

Precott, Feb. 18.—Unusual interest was centred on the sermon preached by Rev. K. W. Barton, pastor of the Presbyterian church here, on Sunday last.

This was an account of the unanimous letters received by this clergyman, protesting in strong language against his series of sermons on the German people and their connection with this world-wide war.

The edifice was packed to the doors, by people representing every denomination in town. The preacher referred briefly to the letters he had received, and told of his having placed the correspondence in the hands of detectives to ferret out, if possible, the guilty parties, that punishment commensurate with the case, may be meted out.

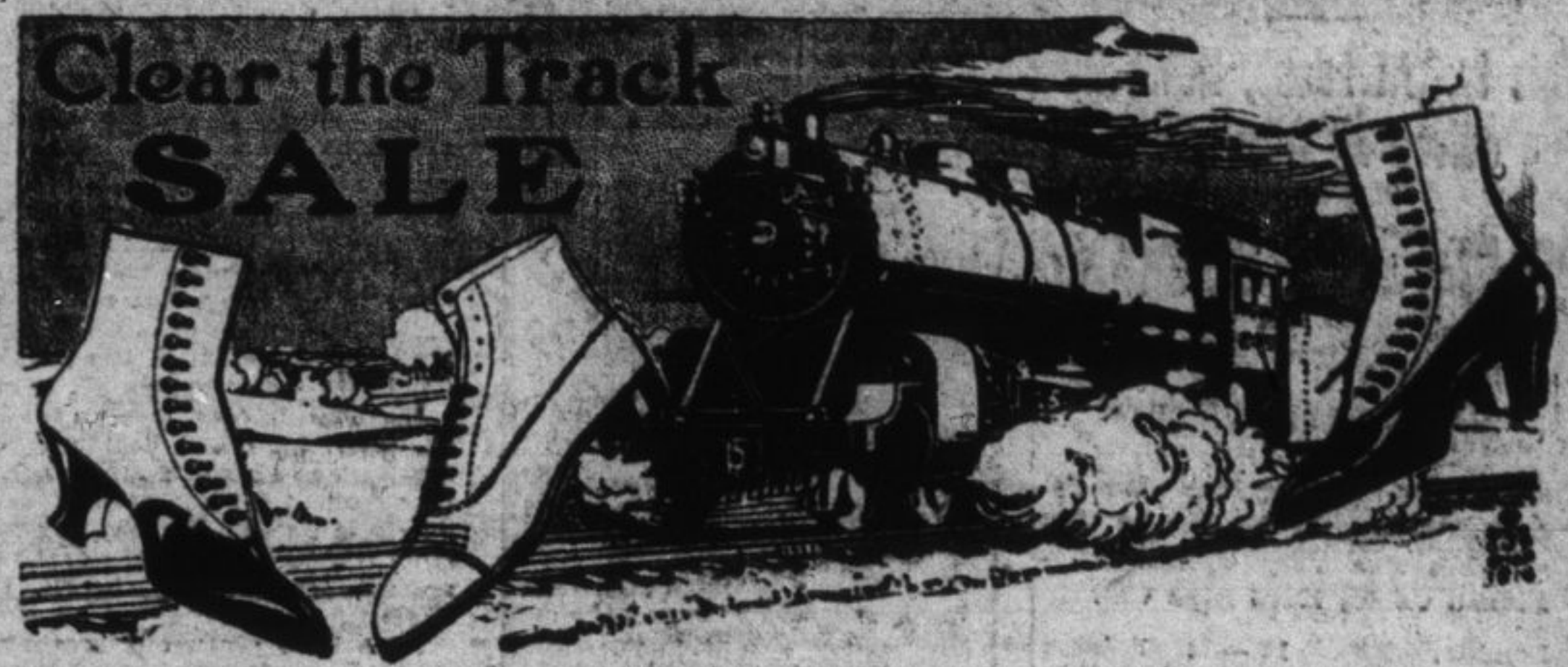
Died Suddenly.
