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A REMARKABLE EFFECT.

Watch Is Heard Ticking In Head of Girl. Philadelphia, Feb. 20.—What physicians described as a rare and remarkable case of tinnitus was exhibited here last night at a meeting of the section of otology and laryngology of the College of Physicians. The case was that of a five-year-old girl in whose head a sound resembling the ticking of a watch can be distinctly heard.

The ticking sound has been going on in the child's head for two months according to the physicians who brought her to the meeting. By placing their ears close to the side of her head those present could plainly hear the sound, but none of the specialists was able to determine the cause of the ticking.
