

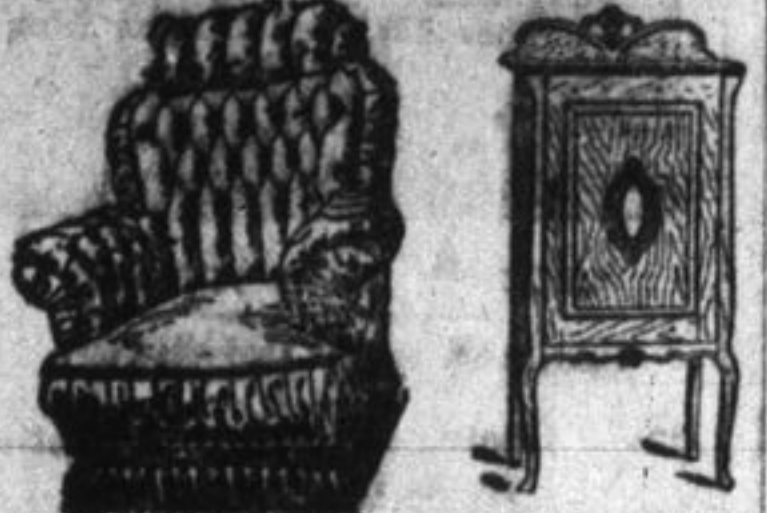

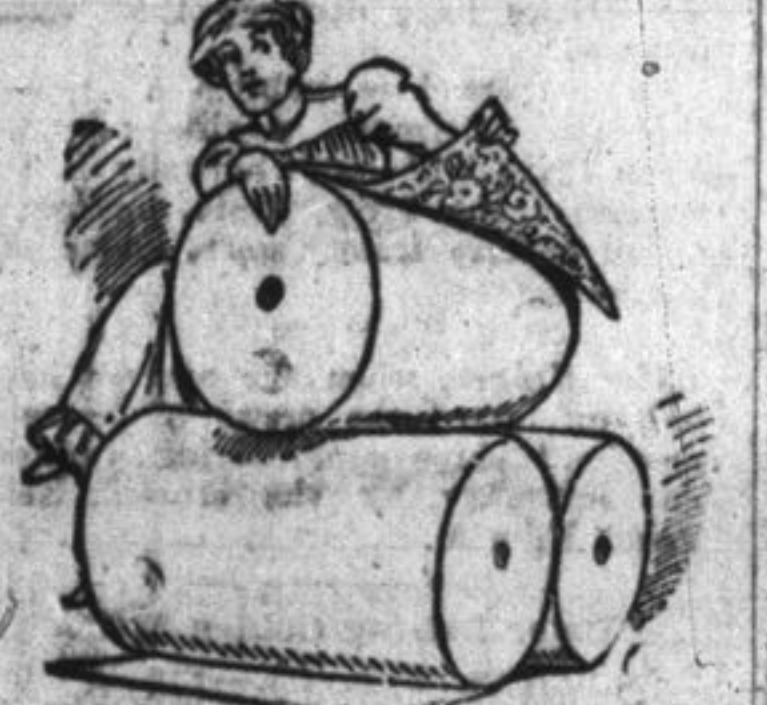

## PROTEST OF CLERGYMEN OVER THE CONSECRATION OF 21ST BATTALION COLORS

Exclusively by Anglican Bishop and Clergy—Nine Kingston Ministers Refused to Attend the Ceremony.

The following letter has been handed to the Whig on behalf of the Kingston clergymen whose names are attached thereto:

"Kingston, Ont., Feb. 22, 1915.  
"To the Kingston Veterans' Association."

"We, the undersigned, ministers in the city of Kingston, desire to express our regret that we cannot attend at the presentation of king's and regimental colors to the 21st Battalion, second Canadian Expeditionary Force. We take this position because, according to public announcement, six clergymen of the Anglican church are to take part in the consecration ceremonies, and no minister of any other church is recognized, except by invitation to be present.

"We beg to call attention to the fact that the other churches of the city are not lacking in civic or patriotic pride. Without exception, they have been interested in the soldiers, and have co-operated, in every possible way, with the military authorities in ministering to their comfort and spiritual needs. People of all classes have been appealed to in behalf of the funds for this presentation, and have responded liberally. Every Christian denomination has ministers who would 'worthily represent the citizens on this notable occasion.

"We mean no disrespect toward those who are appointed to officiate, but out of respect for ourselves and the congregations we serve, and in protest against the action of your association, we feel that it is demanded of us that we, at least, show our disapproval by declining to be present.

The following reply was handed the press by the presiding officer of the Veterans' Association:

"I would prefer the communication being placed before the association, before having anything to say to the press, but inasmuch as the authors have seen fit to give a copy of this communication to you, rather than allow me to first present it to the association, over which I have been elected to preside, and permit me to reply to them, giving both to the press afterwards, which I think is the usual course of common courtesy, all I can do is to assure the protesting clergy, that their protest will receive the most serious consideration.

"In what was done last night in the consecration ceremony, I am advised that I followed precedent, history and regulations in asking the clergy of his most gracious majesty's own faith to bestow their blessing on the king's colors. Regretting for the sake of all, that anything of an unpleasant nature should follow so pleasant an event, I am, Sir, respectfully, Fred. J. Ingledew."
