OVER THE CONSECRATION OF 21ST BATTALION COLORS

Refused to Attend the Ceremony. The following letter has been hand-

We, the undersigned, ministers in regimental colors to the 21st Battal- after our arms are victorious, ion, second Canadian Expeditionary Force. We take this position be that 'Johnnie Canuck's the Boy.' cause, according to public announcement, six clergymen of the Anglican church are to take part in the consecration ceremonies, and no minis-

ter of any other church is recognized,

by invitation to be present. "We beg to call attention to "the fact that the other churches of the city are not lacking in civic or patriotic pride. Without exception, they have been interested in the soldiers, and have 'co-operated, in every possible way, with the military authorities in ministering to their comfort and spiritual needs. People of all classes have been appealed to in behalf of

"We mean no disrespect toward those who are appointed to officiate but out of respect for ourselves and the congregations we serve, and in protest against the action of your as-sociation, we feel that it is demanded of us that we, at least, show our dis-approval by declining to be present.
