

KINGSTON ODDFELLOWS

HONORED DONALD MCINTYRE, GRAND MASTER.

At Reception Held in the City Hall on Monday Night—Presented Him With Address—Ninth Anniversary of Granite Lodge.

The Oddfellows of Kingston honored Donald M. McIntyre, grand master of the provincial grand lodge of the Independent Order of Oddfellows, on Monday night, when they tendered him a reception in the City Hall. The occasion marked the ninth anniversary of Granite Lodge, the youngest lodge of the order in the city, and of which Mr. McIntyre is a charter member.

The hall was filled to the doors, in spite of the counter attractions, showing the warm esteem in which the grandmaster is held by the order in this city. During the evening, he was presented with an address. The occasion was the first the members had of congratulating Mr. McIntyre in his election to the high office of grand master, and at the same time to extend congratulations to him on his appointment as chairman of the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board.

Robert Meek ably carried out the duties of chairman, and the order also had as their guest L. B. Cooper, of Belleville, deputy grandmaster. Both the grandmaster and deputy grandmaster addressed the gathering. In addition to the addresses there was a musical programme, and the evening was a most delightful one to all who were present.

In giving the opening address Mr. Meek referred to the anniversary of Granite Lodge, and stated that Kingston had reason to be proud of all the lodges of this order in the city. He referred to the fact that Mr. McIntyre was a member of Granite Lodge, and speaking generally of the work of the order in Kingston, stated that

all the lodges were progressive, and that the total membership numbered one thousand. "Oddfellowship in Kingston is growing and prospering," he added. The order was not one of the largest now, but the largest. It had a membership of two million.

Mr. Meek read a letter from W. F. Nickle, M. P., in which the latter expressed regret at not being able to be present. Mr. Nickle was one of

the speakers at the event in the Armories, Monday evening. The date of the reception to the grand master was arranged some time ago, long before the date for the event at the armories was decided upon.

After his address, Mr. Meek called upon Charles Higgins, of Kingston, district deputy grand master, to read the address presented to Mr. McIntyre after which the grand master made an eloquent reply. Mr. McIntyre returned thanks for

the kind expressions voiced in the address, stating that they were appreciated all the more because of the fact that they came from men under whom he had been made an Oddfellow.

"Since I left Kingston and have been engaged in my new position," said Mr. McIntyre, "I have seen a great deal of the work of the order and the more I see of it the more I am impressed with the work it is doing."

The grand master referred to the war and the part the order was taking in it. The grand executive had set apart a substantial sum of money out of the general funds, to keep members who had gone to the front in good standing. Two hundred members left on the first contingent, and it was felt that the order should do this for the members who were offering their services to fight for king and country. In addition to this the executive had decided that the members should be given an opportunity of assisting, and for this reason a voluntary subscription had been opened, and it had met with a substantial response. This money was being used to supplement the grants to dependants. The speaker referred to the growth of the order, and made special reference to new lodges he had the honor of organizing since taking over the duties of grand master.

L. B. Cooper, deputy grand master, paid tribute to the work of the grand master, and dwelt on the work of the order in a very interesting manner.

The musical part of the programme consisted of selections by Salisbury's orchestra, solos by Allan Lemmon, a duet by Messrs. Allan and Frederick Haflner, and character songs by Mr. Williams, of Toronto, every number of which merited the hearty applause given. Sydney Salisbury presided at the piano for the different numbers.

The affair was brought to a close with the singing of the national anthem.

The grand secretary, William Brooks, was prevented from being present, through illness, and his absence was much regretted.

THE COLLEGIATES WON

JUNIOR INTERCOLLEGIATE GAME WITH QUEEN'S III

By a Score of 3 Goals to 1—Queen's Scored Their Only Goal During the Last Minute of Play.

The junior intercollegiate hockey match played on Monday night, at the covered rink, between Collegiates and Queen's III, was won by K.C.I. by the score of 3 to 1. Queen's at times pounded at the Collegian's nets but failed to make any impression until the last minute of play, when McQuay, unexpectedly, broke through K.C.I. defense and landed the lone tally.

This game was played off under intercollegiate rules, and was also divided into three twenty-minute periods. The first of these was slow, on account of the bad condition of the ice. Mills and Countryman were sent to the bench for tripping, while Stinson, the third Queen's player, was given a rest for lagging. There were no penalties handed out by Referee A. Brouse to K.C.I. in this period. After twelve minutes of strenuous playing K.C.I. was rewarded by Ferguson landing a goal, which ended the scoring for the first period: K. C.I., 1; Queen's, 0.

The second period opened with faster playing, after the ice had been scraped. Ferguson, J. Stewart, R. Millan and H. Toland, for K.C.I., made a good showing and repeatedly bucked the fresh players that Queen's made use of in this period. The latter were determined to pull out a victory, but although K.C.I. never made a change in a player, it frustrated all attempts of the tri-color to score. Zeron was a noticeable player for Queen's in this period, and his long clean rushes would have scored had he got the support he needed. Twice he missed the nets in the second period only by a fraction of an inch. J. Watts in goal for K.C.I. deserves much credit. Stinson and Cattanch, on the tri-color line-up, also played well. Taking the second period—all through

Queen's had the advantage and created some critical moments for K.C.I. However, after thirteen minutes play, the Collegiates scored, R. Millan doing the trick on a swift onslaught upon Taylor, Queen's goal tender. The second period ended 2 to 0 in favor of K.C.I.

Fifteen minutes of the third period had elapsed before any score was made. J. Stewart then found the nets for K.C.I., being assisted by some pretty combination on the part of R. Millan and G. Stewart. Four minutes later McQuay scored Queen's only tally on a lone rush. This period was very rough and penalties were handed out to J. Stewart, H. Toland and G. Stewart for K.C.I., and to McQuay, of Queen's, for tripping. The teams: K.C.I.—Goal, J. Watts; defense, Ferguson, W. Carroll; rover, J. Stewart; centre, G. Stewart; wings, R. Millan, H. Toland.

Queen's III—Goal, Taylor; defense, Zeron, Countryman; rover, McQuay; centre, Stinson; wings, Cattanch, Kenner.
