

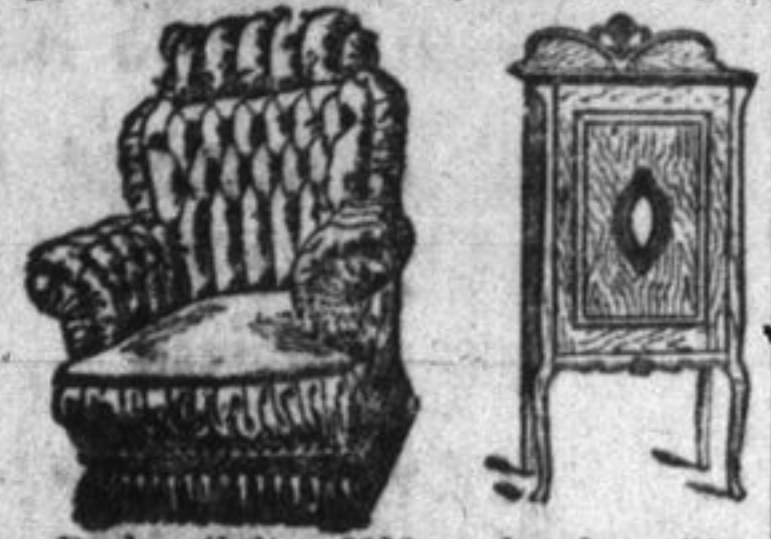

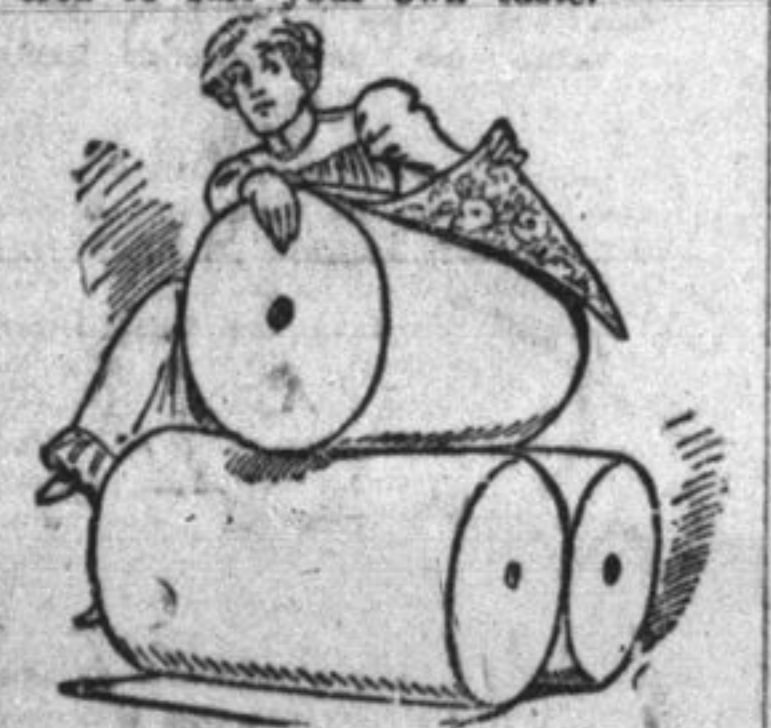

COMMANDS R. C. H. A.

LIEUT. W. E. STEACY HAS BEEN MADE A CAPTAIN.

Members of 21st Battalion Have Half Holiday—Sergt.-Major Jordan to Publish Gunnery's Guide.

Lieut. W. E. Steacy has been appointed a captain and is commander of the R.C.H.A. depot battery. Lieut. J. H. Roberts and Lieut. R. Stewart have been appointed respectively in command of the right and left sections of the battery.

A QUEEN'S GRADUATE.

Winnipegger Is Youngest Doctor On Canadian Staff.

Among the eight medical men appointed to complete the medical staff of the First Canadian contingent is a young Winnipeg doctor, K. C. Dean, M.D.

Dr. Dean graduated in medicine from Queen's University in 1914, but later decided to take a post-graduate student course in the Manitoba Medical College, Winnipeg. Dr. Dean, like a large number of other eastern graduates, took advantage of the superior hospital facilities found in Winnipeg for the completion of a practical medical education. During the present term the young doctor devoted himself almost entirely to the hospital clinics, becoming noted throughout Canada.

Dr. Dean is a brother of the president of the Conservative Association of Port Arthur. For several months he practiced at Carlyle, Sask., but abandoned his practice to continue his studies in medicine. Dr. Dean will be the youngest army surgeon in General Anderson's army, being only twenty-three years of age.

FUNERAL OF MRS. WIGLE

Who Swallowed Nail and Darning Needle.

Kingville, Ont., Feb. 25.—The funeral was held here of Mrs. Alvin Wigle, aged fifty-one years, who died in Harper hospital, Detroit, from the effects of swallowing a darning needle, a nail, some hair pins and several buttons. The discovery of the articles in her stomach was made by an X-ray. An attempt was made to remove them, but she died on the operating table.

The death of her husband fifteen months ago slightly unbalanced her mind, her children think.

He is a brother of Mrs. A. K. Kirkpatrick, "The Chestnuts," corner Wellington and Johnson streets.
