**2,177 ENEMIES INTERNED.**

In Canada Since Outbreak Of Hostilities, Report Shows.

Ottawa, Feb. 25.—A return tabled in the House of Commons by the minister of justice shows that since the outbreak of the war, 2,177 Germans and Austrians have been taken into custody in Canada as prisoners of war. The detention camps are at Halifax, Quebec, Kingston, Petawawa, Spirit Lake, Kapuskasing, Brandon, Lethbridge, Veron and Nanaimo.

**DETROIT'S COUNTER OFFER**

Names \$24,000,000; Gives D.U.R. Ten Days To Accept.

Detroit, Mich., Feb. 25.—The Municipal Street Railway Commission, in its ultimatum to the D.U.R., did somewhat better than split the difference between the company's demands and the city's appraisal of the value of the lines and equipment.

The appraisal was about \$19,000,000. The company demanded \$25,500,000. The commission, offered to-day \$24,000,000. It gave the D.U.R. ten days to accept. If the offer is refused, the city will order the street railway off the streets where franchisees have expired, and build competing lines.
