British Soldier in London Hospital Has Strange Experience.

London, March 1.—Amongst the many curious cases of wounds which have been investigated by X-rays at St. Bartholomew's Hospital is one in which a German bullet was found embedded in the muscular part of a soldier's heart.

In three days' fighting around Ypres, the Germans lost 400 killed and 6,000 wounded or prisoners.

The allied fleet of forty warships penetrated the Dardanelles long distance, destroying two Asiatic side forts, and is now shelling fort Dardanelles.

Admiral Von Pohl, chief of the German admiralty staff, has been selected to succeed Admiral Von Ingenohl whose removal from command of the German fleet, was announced on Friday.

The Germans have a new weapon in the shape of liquid fire which they project into the trenches with terrible effect.

Great Britain and France have notified neutral countries that they hold themselves at liberty to stop all shipping to and from Germany and her allies, because of German submarine attacks.

The allied fleet fired a thousand shells at the Dardanelles forts Saturday afternoon.

At Paris it is officially announced that a French cruiser (name not mentioned) has arrested the American steamer Dacla in the English channel, taking her to Brest.
