

WIN YOUR OWN SPURS

SAYS REV. DR. SPARKING IN SERMON TO STUDENTS.

Delivered Strong Discourse On "Temptation," In Convocation Hall Sunday Morning—Battles Which Have To Be Fought.

"Win your own spurs. Get your bread with the sweat of your brow. Scorn to be a gambler, who is always on the hunt to get something for nothing."

Thus spoke Rev. Dr. William Sparking, pastor of Dominion Methodist church, Ottawa, in a strong sermon to the students, on "Temptation" in Convocation hall, Sunday morning.

The speaker said that there was no sin in being tempted; the sin was in consenting to sin. "The question has often been asked," added the speaker, "as to whether the temptation of Christ was a real temptation. I unhesitatingly reply, 'yes,' to this question. It would have no significance to us had it not been real. Christ was tempted on all sides. He struggled against temptation through his whole life. He braced His will against it as you and I have to do. He objected by choice, and not of necessity. He had to resist."

"The only things which cannot be tempted are sinners and stones. Temptation comes to the palace as well as to the cottage, to the educated in one form and to the uneducated in another form. Temptation is inseparable from the life we have to live. There are times when every one must get into the desert of loneliness, times when you will be mis-

understood even when you are trying to make your way clear. There are problems in our life that no person can solve but ourselves. We must take counsel with ourselves. If you would be saved from a stereotyped life you must make up your mind to do some hard thinking.

"We must fight out these battles for ourselves. We will become stronger and better men for having fought out these battles for ourselves. We have learned the most satisfying lesson of life when that which we do for ourselves makes us stronger."

"It is always the new powers which are attacked. The tempter is always watching for people who are too weak to be made the stewards of trust. The most powerful temptation that appeals to us to-day is that of achieving wealth, riches and glory without sacrifice. There is nothing to be gained worth while but by sacrifice."

"I honor the men who have done the uniform and are ready to fight. These men are willing to undergo all the hardships. They are willing to go on the field of battle and give up their life. Their names will never die."

Recovering From Injuries. James Patterson, Pittsburg, who, about a month ago, was taken to the general hospital suffering from terrible injuries received while cutting down a tree, which fell upon him, was able to be removed, in James Reid's ambulance, to his home again on Sunday afternoon. Mr. Patterson received several broken ribs and a fractured collar bone, one of the ribs penetrating his lung.

At the Arena Gardens, Toronto, Saturday afternoon, Varsity II easily defeated Queen's II in the first home-and-home games for the Intercollegiate championship. It was a poor exhibition of hockey from start to finish. The work of Zinn at left wing for Varsity was the only feature of the game. This player was easily the best on the ice, and he gets the credit for his team's easy victory. He alone scored seven goals. Smith was next best, while Wright was Queen's best man.

O.H.A., Raises Objection. Though Melville's hockey team were declared winners of the Saskatchewan League, and thereby became holders of the Allan cup, held by Regina, last year, the Saskatchewan Hockey Association, the Ontario Hockey Association may not accept them as fit opponents, and may withdraw the challenge that had been sent in the usual course of procedure. Notification was sent Friday night to Secretary Robinson of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association that the O.H.A. were not inclined to accept the provincial bodies as having final judgment on the qualification of their teams when the Allan cup series was reached, and that their objection was raised to playing a team that included the Mackenzies and Darcy Smith.

Enlarge Hydro-Electric. At the meeting in Toronto of the Associated Board of Trade, R. A. McLeland, Kingston, reported the discussion on the motion that the Hydro-Electric enlarge its commission to include an Eastern Ontario member and to devote greater attention to the east. The three members at present composing the board represent mainly the central part of the province, the speaker declared.

President Young ruled the motion sectional and it was amended, asking in its new form for generally enlarged representation on the Hydro Board. It was carried.

The Savage-G.T.R. Settlement. Justice Sutherland has approved the settlement (recently reported in the Whig), in the case of Savage vs. Grand Trunk Railway. Arthur Savage of Kingston was killed last October at a level crossing on the company's line, at Kingston Mills, and left a widow and three children, for whom the claim was made. The settlement is for \$3,000, of which \$1,000 is to be paid the widow, and \$2,000 paid into court to the credit of the three children, and \$20 a month is to be allowed the widow for their maintenance.

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MEMBER OF QUEEN'S ENGINEERS

Writes To His Parents Regarding Equipment He Carries Overseas

Lance-Corpl. C. B. Bate, with the Queen's Engineer's overseas, writes as follows to his parents in Ottawa: "The first thing to tell you is that we are going to-morrow, the 8th. We have discarded the Oliver equipment and have adopted the Webb. In my knapsack, I carry one undershirt, one knee-length underdrawers, two pairs socks, a housewife, a spare housewife holding quinine tablets, bichloride tablets, one towel, one pair Cayuse leather mits, Army issue, one knitted scarf, one balacava cap, 100 rounds of thirty-two ammunition for my pistol, also my great-coat. My haversack is carried on the left side of my belt. In it I carry diary, automatic Savage ten shot, 32 calibre pistol, my own leather gauntlets, knife, fork and spoon, soap and rations. I forgot to mention my hold-all in the knapsack, containing tooth-brush, razor, etc. Water-bottle comes on right side of belt and under it an entrenching tool. The handle for this tool is carried fastened to the bayonet on the left side.

"We have five pouches on each side of the buckle each carrying three five shell clips. A 'billy tin' or canteen is carried on top of knapsack. We also carry the new Ross rifle, which has been condemned like most of the Canadian equipment."

"Our tool-carts and monkey wagons all go with us. The tool carts contain everything one can think of, including enough gun-cotton to blow up the whole of Lark hill.

"I will write as often as I can, but remember that my letters might not reach you whereas your will always reach me."

"As a result of the establishment of the post office system in Canada, the post office has adopted new rural mail delivery combined letter and parcel post boxes to meet the new conditions. The price of the new box is \$4.50. On the paying of an additional \$1.50 and returning the signal device of the old box the new box will be issued. The offer to exchange boxes will be open until the 15th of May as the contractor has now completed his contract."

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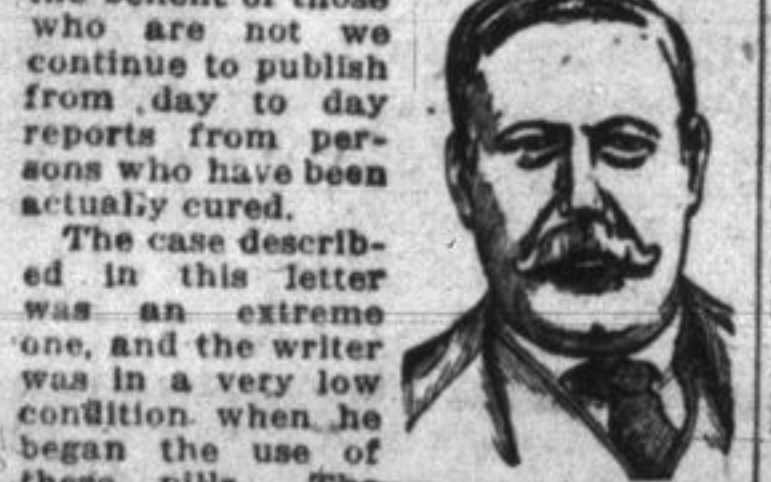
