CHANGES MADE

In the Personnel of the City Engineer's Staff.

ENGINEER RE-ENGAGED

CLERK RE-APPOINTED AND STENOGRAPHER ADDED.

Services of H. S. Dick Dispersed With A More Modern System To Be Introduced Into the Engineer's Department.

The city engineers department has been re-organized by the City Council. At the last meeting of council, the engineer and his staff were asked to send in their resignations...

That R. J. McClelland be engaged as engineer for one year at a salary of \$1,500. He shall have full control of the office staff, and be responsible for their work.

That A. Pettigrew be engaged as clerk at a salary of \$600 per annum. His duties shall consist of keeping the books, all records, making reports and such other work as may be assigned to him by the engineer.

That a lady be engaged as stenographer and assistant at a salary of \$300 per annum.

That Thomas Timms be engaged as foreman of streets at a salary of \$900 per annum.

Under the present arrangements, the report, stated, the engineer will be required to look after the work which an engineer is supposed to do, viz, the taking of levels, drawing plans, specifications, etc. At present it was found that a great portion of his time is by his own choice, given to clerical work in the office, which can be done as efficiently by a cheaper man.

The board suggested that a separate compartment be partitioned off from the present quarters, making a private office for the engineer.

Ald. Graham, chairman of the Board of Works, said that the proposed re-organization would save the city \$800 a year. H. S. Dick was relieved of duty. He was paid \$900 a year, and had been doing most of the outside engineering work. In future, Mr. McClelland would do this.

Objections Raised. Aids. Hughes, Peters and Wright opposed cutting the clerk's salary down from \$800 to \$600, and adding a lady stenographer at \$300. Ald. Wright said that the city clerk's stenographer would do the necessary typewriting for \$50 a year.

Ald. Kent pointed out that the Board of Works report on re-organization really meant an increase of \$100 a year in the cost of the engineer's office. Mr. Dick was re-appointed by the City Council, but was added to the staff by the engineer because the latter had too much work to do.

Ald. Peters informed council that City Engineer McClelland had too much work to do. He had to tell late into the night. If he was to do all the outside engineering work, Chief Clerk Pettigrew instead of having less work to do, as suggested by the report, would have more to look after.

Ald. Litton favored the proposals to have the city engineer out on the streets. Mr. Pettigrew, he held, should not be cut down.

Aids. Hughes and Gardiner, moved in amendment that A. Pettigrew be engaged at \$800 a year and that the clause regarding a lady stenographer be struck out.

Ald. Wright moved in amendment to the amendment that Mr. Pettigrew's salary be \$800 and that Miss M. Bell, of the city clerk's office, be given \$50 to do the typewriting of the engineer's office.

Aids. Couper and Gillespie, two members of the Board of Works, favored forcing Mr. Pettigrew's salary at \$800 as before.

Ald. Nickle held that \$600 was enough for a clerk in the city engineer's office, which more than anything was in need of a stenographer.

Ald. O'Connor held that the report of the Board of Works was in the best interests of the city, and should be adopted as presented.

Ald. Hughes changed his amendment to read that the salary of Mr. Pettigrew be \$800, intimating that he would support a stenographer at \$200 a year. Ald. Wright withdrew his amendment to the amendment.

Year—Mayor Sutherland, and Aids. Couper, Gardner, Gillespie, Hughes, Kent, Litton, Newman, Peters, Wright—10.

Nays—Aids. Clugston, Graham, Nickle, O'Connor, Richardson, White, Wormwith—7.

The vote on the clause for the appointment of a lady stenographer at a salary of \$300 was carried on this division.

Year—Mayor Sutherland and Aids. Couper, Gardner, Gillespie, Hughes, Kent, Litton, Peters, Wormwith—5.

Nays—Aids. Clugston, Graham, Newman, Nickle, O'Connor, Richardson, Wright and White—8.

Ald. Graham pitched into the members of the council for amending the Board of Works' recommendation regarding the re-organization of the engineer's department, and called them humbugs, to which Ald. Hughes objected, but Ald. Nickle explained that humbugs were sweet things, and there was nothing really offensive in being called by that name.

With Kingston, Brockville, Smith's Falls and Ottawa As Members — Golf Is Dead In England.

Frank W. Cavanaugh has signed a new contract for three years as head coach of the Dartmouth football team.

The Melville (Saskatchewan) Northerners successfully defended the Allan cup defeating Prince Albert in the second game of the home and home series 6 to 5, and winning the provincial championship in the round up two goals 15 to 13.

On a rain-drenched, dangerous track, D. Rezia, an Italian driver, engaged in his first American speed struggle, won the Grand Prix automobile race at the Panama Pacific Exposition Saturday, in Car No. 9. His time was 7 hours, 7 minutes and 57 1/2 seconds. Howard Wilcox, in No. 26, was second.

Howard McNamara had the ligaments of his shoulder torn in the game at Ottawa, and he will be out for the balance of the season.

Harry Cameron, of the Torontos, is out of the game for the season with water on the knee, as the result of the game with the Shamrocks last Wednesday. Walker, of the same team, also injured his knee in the same game, but played Saturday night.

Frederick Ayer, driving a team of fourteen foxhounds, finished first late yesterday in the 64-mile Solomon Dorby for dog teams in Nome, Alaska. His time was 6 hours and 23 minutes. Percy Blatchford, driving the Downing-Blatchford team, was second in 6 hours and 35 minutes. At last reports Leonard Seppala was leading "Scotty" Allan, driving the Allan-Darling team of Malamutes, in third place.

When the Kingston Frontenacs went to Brockville for an exhibition match with the brews, champions of the Southern Section of the Ottawa Valley League, they were accompanied by "Jim" Sutherland, the father of the Kingston organization. He believed that the season would develop more interest than the double schedule between Brockville, Perth and Smith's Falls, which has been in effect the past two seasons.

British golf is absolutely dead, according to Wilfrid Reid, one of England's foremost golfers, who arrived in this country in the steamship Baltic last night. Reid will assume the position as professional of the Seaview Golf club, at Absecon, N.J., and plans to compete in the open championship at Newport, R.I.

"Hundreds of those devoted to golf in England have enlisted," said Reid. "I heard nothing about Verdon, Taylor, Ray or Braid coming to America this season, unless, of course the war should come to an end."

The cause of the objection was Denison who turned out for Halleybury, and who it is claimed did not comply with the residence rule."

Work of Linking up Brockville Is Nearing Completion. Brockville, Ont., March 2.—The hydro-electric line from Prescott to Brockville is nearing completion, and work is being rushed on the transformer station, which occupies a site convenient to the power house of the Brockville light and power department. The line covers a distance of about 10 miles, running through a rich agricultural district between the two towns.

The question arises now as to the source of power; the belief is that it will be brought from Morrisburg, as the line from there to Prescott has been in operation for some months and supplies Winchester, Chesterville and Prescott.

A power radial railway from Toronto to Ottawa through Brockville, is spoken of in connection with the Chateaux Falls project which is thought to be receiving the attention of Sir Adam Beck.

Admirals of the Coast. The recent German raid on the English coast recalls the fact that there are in the peerage a number of gentlemen who hold hereditary rank as admirals or vice-admirals of the coats of different counties. Some of them, however, are well known for other reasons. Thus Lord Londsdale is Hereditary Admiral of Cumberland and Westmoreland, and the Duke of Argyll holds the same rank in the Western Isles. Lord Londesborough whose wife was actually in residence at her Scarborough house during the bombardment, is Vice-Admiral of the Yorkshire coast. Lord Mostyn is Vice-Admiral of North Wales and Carmarthenshire, Lord Mount Edgcumbe of Cornwall, Lord Ormonde of Leinster, Lord Stradbroke of Suffolk, Lord Yarborough of Lincolnshire, and there are others.
