THE ANNUAL MEETING HELD ON TUESDAY EVENING.

R. Meek Was Re-Elected President— Good Work Was Done By the Board During the Year.

The annual meeting of the Board of Trade was held in the board rooms on Tuesday with a large number present. The reports of the business done during the past year were good. Some of the committees had not been as active as those in other classes in this district, but much good work had been accomplished.

R. A. McLelland reported on the meeting of the Associated Boards of Trade that was held in Toronto in February. The resolution for the enlargement of the Hydro-Electric Commission was passed by the Associated Boards.

The report of the year's work of the board which was read by the president, R. Meek, was very complete, and R. J. Carson moved a vote of appreciation for the work done by the president, and a resolution to have the report put in booklet form was carried.

R. A. McLelland, in commenting on the report of the president, said that the street railway company was getting power from the city at less than cost, and indirectly the other purchasers of electricity in the city had to make up this deficit instead of it being equally divided.
