TORY MEMBER BOUGHT

HORSES FOR GOVERNMENT IN HIS OWN RIDING.

Dewitt Foster, King, In the Lime-light—Mr. McCraig Charges Discrimination Against Farmers.

Ottawa, March 4.—Another Conservative member of parliament is experiencing the embarrassment of a Buckley. An official statement brought down by the minister of militia showed that A. Dewitt Foster, the representative of King's Nova Scotia, had occupied considerable time in buying horses for the government. Of the 428 purchased by him throughout the province 224 had been purchased in his own riding.

Dealing with the horse industry in the course of his practical and oratorical speech in the budget debate, Archie B. McCraig of West Kent, directed attention to the fact that serious injustice and injury were being done the agricultural raiser or bors by the system of export prohibition established by the government. Farmers found themselves with hundreds of horses for which they had no market. Mr. McCraig paid high tribute to the patriotic and efficient work done by Sir Adam Beck, but criticized the conduct and operations of certain men who had been foisted upon him by the government.

H. Stevens, Vancouver, concluded his speech at the resumption of the debate. He maintained that it was the war and not the fault of the government's administration which had caused the serious situation in the dominion's finances. He urged the opening up of trade from the Pacific coast with Russia, and was sorry to see the reduction in the estimates of the Department of Trade and Commerce.

An inkling of what promises to be one of the big sensations of the session in connection with the purchase of war supplies is contained in a return tabled in the house by Major-General Sam Hughes. It has to do with the purchase of motor-truck equipment for the first and second contingents.

A WARNING.

Beware of the mails for internal machines! This is the warning given out by the government Inspector of institutions. Several superintendents of Kingston civic institutions have already had warnings forwarded them issued from the Inspector's office. R. Baldwin, manager of the Home for the Aged, and the matron of the Orphans' and Infants' Homes respectively have also been served with these warnings. The Inspector has learned that explosives are being mailed in this form and great precaution should be manifested upon the part of everyone opening such parcels.

Case of Juvenile Courage.

An instance of juvenile courage, worthy of a Hentz novel, is related of a sailor boy on board H.M.S., "Tiger" during the last fleet action in the north sea.

The periscope glasses of a turret were forged by smoke and spray making it difficult if not impossible to train the guns satisfactorily. A volunteer was asked for who would someone venture outside the turret and wipe the glasses? A boy, first class, climbed outside and cleaned the periscope. Firing recommenced and the boy was forgotten. He remained on the turret and cleaned the glass throughout the action, being practically deafened by the roar of the guns.

Wonderful Beatty.

"Wayfarer," in the Nation, gives these interesting facts as to the North Sea battle: Fire from the Lion was opened at 22,000 yards.

The first two shots missed; the third was a hit. Before she had been in action an hour three of the German ships were on fire, while all their nine vessels directed their guns almost entirely on the Lion. Admiral Beatty directed the operations from the bridge, and he absolutely refused to take cover. "He is wonderful," writes one of his officers, "the idol of every man in the squadron."

Fined For Fast Driving.

In record time the city treasury was enriched to the extent of ten dollars by Police Magistrate Farrell

imposing a fine of \$5 on two brothers who were before him on Thursday morning for being drunk and disorderly.

John and George Clyde

were furiously driving down Princess street on Wednesday afternoon when they were stopped and arrested at the corner of King street. They pleaded guilty and paid the fine.

A painful accident befell E. Hill, an employee of the Canadian Locomotive Company, while he was at work on Wednesday afternoon.

The workman's third finger of the right hand became caught in the machine he was operating and was badly lacerated.

The victim was taken to the general hospital, and Dr. W. G. Mylks attended to his injuries.

The injured man was taken to his home on Nelson street.

When the spring assizes are held here on March 16th a very interesting case will be heard, with a resident of the county as plaintiff and a Toronto doctor as defendant.
