British Columbia Has an Interesting and Busy Industry.

ON A NEW TELESCOPE.

Cast for Canada's Immense Instrument Nearly Ready.

It is confidently expected that the mounting for the great new 72-inch reflecting telescope of the Dominion Government Observatory at Ottawa will be completed by October.

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CANADA'S PEAT BOGS.

They Are a Source of Great Wealth If Properly Developed.

Attention is being drawn to the possibility of expansion of Canadian commerce and industry as a result of the war. This may take the form of domestic production of articles for a supply of which we have been dependent upon foreign sources.

The peat bogs of Northern Holland alone it is stated that about \$3,000,000 worth of peat fuel is made yearly, and over 200,000 tons of peat moss is raised.
