## PASSED EXAMINATIONS

HELD IN KINGSTON FOR MASTERS AND MATES.  
Navigation School Established Here Under Direction of Capt. H. N. McMaster—Candidates Do Not Need To Go To Montreal And Toronto.

Capt. H. N. King, supervising examiner of the masters and mates, Toronto, for the inland waters, has been holding examinations at the custom house in Kingston for the past three days. The following candidates passed the examinations: Edward Smith, W. V. Smith, M. J. Barry, George Brown and Edward Phelix. Out of six applicants, five were successful. A. Rushford, M. J. Barry and H. Martin were successful in a former examination held here a month ago. All the candidates were prepared for the examination by Capt. H. N. McMaster, who is nautical instructor of the navigation class in the School of Mining, at Queen's.

It may not be generally known, but navigation is being taught in Kingston, and no longer is it necessary for candidates to go to Toronto and Montreal in order to secure this training. All the candidates can be prepared in Kingston without going to these outside ports, and this is certainly a great benefit to local marine men.

The school will be continued the remainder of the winter and will be resumed next winter under the instruction of Capt. McMaster. The class in navigation was organized by this captain, whose ability along this line of work is well known. It is hoped that as many as possible will avail themselves of the opportunity now afforded them to prepare themselves for examination.

## PILOTS WILL SUFFER

As Result of Cutting Off of Vessels This Summer.  
"That Kingston pilots will be hard hit this summer as a result of the taking off of many of the lake boats for the trade in the old country, was the report made in marine circles on Saturday morning.

"I know of twenty-seven vessels which will be missing from the lakes this summer," said one marine man in speaking to the Whig, "and it will make quite a difference to Kingston, and no doubt there will be many more vessels taken off. This will mean that in these twenty-seven boats alone we will be minus one hundred trips in a month, while the financial loss to pilots will reach say \$1,200.

Arrangements were made for five steamers of the Montreal Transportation Company to engage in trade in the West Indies.

"It looks as if it would be a very quiet summer in marine circles," said another mariner. "I don't think there will be a great deal for the vessels until late in the summer."

Musical Organization Buys Mrs. Mulloy's New Composition.  
A Toronto musical company, with international connection, has purchased from Mrs. L. W. Mulloy, Kingston, her latest song composition "Smiling Soaks For Daddy," which she sang at the Grand Opera House last week.
