AT EARL ROBERTS GRAVE

A Kingston Soldier Photographed as He Was Paying a Visit of Respect to the Tomb of the Illustrious Dead.

The Whig has the privilege of presenting to its readers to-day a very interesting and unique picture, that of two Canadians standing at the grave-side of the late Earl Roberts, in St. Paul's Cathedral, London, Eng. One of them is Sergt. Major S. H. Leach, Warrant Officer, Kingston, Ont., and the other Sergt. Major Fletcher, of Winnipeg. Sergt. Major Leach is at present in France with the Army Service Corps, connected with the first contingent. He enlisted at Kingston, where his wife and child still reside with his mother, Mrs. F. W. Smith, Elliott Farm, Kingston Station.

In a recent letter written to his wife, from Salisbury Plains, Sergt. Maj. Leach stated that in November he had been granted six days' leave of absence. Accompanied by Sergt. Maj. Fletcher, he spent a day with an aunt at Sreamham, whom he had not seen since he was fourteen years of age. He goes on to say: "I had hardly a minute to spare while in town, as we were trying to see all the places of interest. On Saturday afternoon we went to see St. Paul's Cathedral, London. We went all through it, and then down into the crypt to see the burial place of Lord Roberts. While we were there, a staff photographer of the Daily Graphic was taking a photograph of Lord Roberts' grave, and seeing us

RESTIVE IN GERMANY.

Social Democrats Revolting In The Prussian Diet.
 Rotterdam, March 6.—It is increasingly evident that the social Democrats of Germany are beginning to revolt against the Prussian refusal to grant a reform of the franchise. Tuesday's discussion of the question led to a scene in the Prussian Diet. While Dr. Liebknecht was braving the anger of the war party he made the remarkable declaration that "democratic control by the people would have prevented the war."

The Vorwarts, in spite of the censor, describes the scene, saying: "March 2nd will remain for all time a remarkable day in the history of the Prussian state. On that day an opportunity was afforded the Government to recognize, not in words, but in deeds, the self-sacrificing courage of the people. The thanks of the whole people would have been offered the Diet if it had used the opportunity for announcing a free franchise, but the position of affairs remain as of old."

"Only one member, Dr. Liebknecht, treated the franchise question as thoroughly as it deserved. When he began to speak the Conservatives and most of the National Liberals in the centre left, the chamber in a demonstrative manner."

"But even if the Government on the grounds that it has nothing to do with the case, refused to hear these words of the Socialists' leaders, the people themselves will hear them. We demand the democratization of the State in body and limb, in law, government and administration. Democratic control by the people would have prevented the war. This gives us the right at this very moment to demand the democratization of the foreign policy. We demand the foreign policy, which can only be built up and developed upon the democratization of the home policy."

THE PATRIOTIC FUND.

Will Distribute Sum of \$3,234.50 for Month of March.
 The amount of relief to be distributed by the Kingston branch of the Canadian Patriotic Fund for the month of March will amount to \$3,234.60. The treasurer of the fund has sent in a requisition to the head office for this amount.

There are at the present time 232 cases on the list of people who are receiving relief in Kingston and Port-mouth.

A Picture of France.

 I have known France more or less well from my student days in Paris in 1879 to the outbreak of the present catastrophe, which was thrust upon unwilling France by the perfection of military savagery. I have seen, I believe, a steady rise in the sturdy spirit of democracy interest in serious problems and in every advance in philosophy, literature, art and science. The word "decadent" has no meaning as applied to France. The nation has been sorely wounded, and by her own sons, but she has made a swift recovery; and since she turned her face from militarism to nation-in-the-world has moved forward in the things that count in civilization more surely than the republic of France. She has the sympathies and good wishes of almost the whole civilized world. She has most certainly mine. With Professor Guillard, I do not see France as a goddess, austere, remote; I see her intensely human, stained with indecencies and blasphemies, scarred with innumerable battles often blinding and stumbling, but fighting on undimmed for ideals she cannot always define.

An old nation perhaps, but her mighty heart is throbbing with unconquerable life.

WAR BULLETINS.

War Secretary Garrison has begun an investigation of the story that United States officers are serving with Canadian contingents.

General French, in a special report Friday afternoon, said there had been no material change in the positions of the forces in Flanders, although the British had captured two German trenches.

Britain has notified the United States that all foodstuffs sent to Germany will be seized and paid for.

The Turkish forts are hastily dismantled and evacuated as the Allies' fleet moves up the Dardanelles.

The Russians have begun a general westward march; Germans and Austrians lose in many battles.

Austria is now threatened with serious famine.

The Allies are making gains along the entire western front.

Prisoners from the German army arriving at Dunkirk say all rations for the troops have been much reduced.

Winnipeg and Montreal regiments of the Second Contingent have arrived safely in Britain.

Gananoque

March 6.—As the assembly room of Gananoque High School, under the auspices of the local Red Cross Society, Mrs. Grant Needham, Toronto, gave an inspiring address on the "Origin and Work of the Red Cross Society."

Gananoque Encampment No. 89, I.O.O.F., sent up quite a large contingent on Wednesday evening for a friendly visit to the arena of the Kingston Encampment, and the visitors were royally entertained.

At the Board of Trade meeting on Thursday evening, the needs for Red Cross work was brought up by C. A. Lewis, manager of the local branch of the Merchants Bank of Canada, and as a result about \$120 was added to the funds for that purpose.

A number from Gananoque drove to the home of Mr. and Mrs. George Peck, a few miles east of the town, last evening for a house party and dance. Messrs. Allan and Mallory furnished music for dancing.

The ladies of the local Red Cross Society entertained their visitor, Mrs. Grant Needham, Toronto, at an afternoon tea at the council chamber in the town hall yesterday afternoon.

Rev. Melville Taylor, pastor of Grace Church, who has been spending the past few days in Toronto at the Dominion Alliance convention, returned home to-day.

High School Inspector J. E. Wetherell, Toronto, found the teaching staff and equipment of the local school well up to the standard requirement. The school had one of the most successful years in the history.

A SUGGESTION MADE.

Move Out A Thousand Of The Farmers.
 Renfrew Mercury.
 It has been talked of before, and it may not be very good reading in parts of Renfrew county; but still there's something in it. That is, that the Government should move out a thousand of the farmers in the wild and timbered lands in the west of Renfrew county and parts of Lanark and Frontenac out to the west; and then reforest all that district with pine. "It is a natural pine district," remarks one well acquainted with the situation. "Look at the abandoned farm after a few years and you will find young pine springing up all over it. It would pay the Government to appropriate these lands, giving the owners acre for acre in the west, and also supplying them with enough money to transport them to the west and keep them over the first year, till they secured their first crop. In fact, it would be a good move to transplant them even to New Ontario, but they would have to be 'carried' there for more than the one season and they would not be able to produce a crop so quickly, which, if the war continues, is a matter of consideration. Leave them where they are and they'll always have comparatively poor crops; while re-forested the district will produce constant revenue to more than finance the moving proposition. There would be some hardships. Some of the old-timers would lament leaving what had been even a hard home to them; but the general result would be greater prosperity."
