A DUTCH OPINION. Holland's Ex-War Minister On The Present Outlook.

Gazette de Hollande. In a continuation of an article published by him some months ago in the Stemmings des Tijds, Mr. Colijn, an ex-Minister for War, discusses the present outlook and states that a Russian success against Germany cannot be considered probable. It can be confidently expected that a fierce struggle will break out in the western theatre of war in the spring. The strength of the parties will then be about balanced. Not much change will be effected in the state of affairs. And what then? asks Mr. Colijn. Considering the circumstances that the war is weighing more heavily than before on the occupied territory and that the destruction is so intense that nothing like it could be cited in all history, Mr. Colijn thinks it probable that an increasing desire to put an end to it all will make its influence felt. "I know," he says, "that Britain does not fear a long duration of the war that she is prepared and able to continue her economic war for years; but will the others be prepared to follow her lead? No, only in doubt on the subject justified, but I believe I shall not be far from the truth, if I answer this question in the negative. "The expectation that the enormous struggle to come in the spring will bring little change in the situation is the basis for my belief that half of the misery of war lies behind us. All this, of course, looking out of consideration the eventualities which might result from states now neutral becoming involved. If Roumania and perhaps even Italy declared war against Austria, Germany could hardly oppose fresh forces to the new armies. Then, I think, the chance of a speedy peace would become much smaller, for then an inch-by-inch retreat through Belgium upon the Rhine would follow and this would last long. So that finally we should be again reduced to uncertainty."

Hog cholera has gained a strong foothold in this district, and many farmers are losing large numbers of animals by having them killed off by the Government inspectors. Uncleaned garbage is one cause of the trouble, but there seem to be other causes. The hogs are each valued by the inspector and two-thirds of their value is paid to the owner. W.
