GERMANS NOW SEEK

TO ESTABLISH DEFENSIVE LINE IN RUSSIAN TERRITORY.

The Russians Declare The Enemy's Attacks Have Lost Force—Right Flank of the Foe Is in Danger

Petrograd, March 8.—Reoccupation by the Russians of Stanislaw is regarded here as justifying their claim that the rapid advance of the Austro-German right flank in East Galicia was hazardous so long as their left flank in Galicia was successfully held back by the Russian forces. The right Austro-German flank advanced impetuously apparently without regard to the inability of the left wing to co-operate in the contemplated encircling movements. The right flank in consequence is now in danger of having the tables turned and being surrounded by Russian forces. The Russians now look for the retirement of the Austrians from Czernowitz and all of Bukovina where the Austrian position will be quite untenable if the Russians are able to continue the successful movement initiated at Stanislaw.

Russian staff officers say since the failure of the Austro-Germans in the Stanislaw region their attacks have weakened not only in that vicinity but in West Galicia, between the rivers Ondava and San. Their attacks, here, in the opinion of the Russian staff, are a device to draw the Russian troops westward from Halicz and the river Dniester.

Having abandoned the offensive along the northern front, the Germans now are seeking merely to fortify the Russian territory taken in the advance from East Prussia and establish a defensive line. This line roughly parallels the border, extending from Simio to Serre, Augustowa along the Bobr river and on to Milawa.

The Russians apparently have been able, however, to interfere seriously with the plan by the advance of the tenth army, which the Germans asserted was virtually destroyed as a result of the German victory in East Prussia. The successes of the tenth army in the Lomza district threaten to compel the withdrawal of the German from Grodno of important maintenance of their communications between the two portions of the German forces in the north.

The governor-general in council has committed the sentence of death passed upon Boyd, Portage la Prairie, to life imprisonment. The condemned man will spend the rest of his life in Stony Mountain penitentiary.

Announcement is made of the inauguration of a weekly steamship service between Canada and France, particularly for the conveyance of war supplies ordered in Canada and the United States for the British War Office.

General Antonio Seavler Corria Barreto has been proclaimed president of the "Republic of Northern Portugal," by a congress of Democrats, who have been in session at Lamego, according to a despatch received from Madrid.

At the conference held at Peking on Saturday between Japanese diplomats and statesmen of China, the Chinese Republic conceded an extension for a period of ninety-nine years of the present Japanese railway system in Manchuria.

Mr. and Mrs. A. F. Bell, Napanee, are spending the winter with their two sons, Rev. A. B. Bell, Illinois, and Rev. E. F. Bell, Michigan. They will go west in the spring for a short visit, after which they will return to Napanee to remain.

The union of two great political families, is announced in the engagement of the Hon. Neil Primrose, M.P., youngest son of the Earl of Rosebery, and Lady Victoria Stanley, only daughter of the late Lord Stanley of Preston, governor-general of Canada from 1888 to 1893.

TROUSERS FOR SOLDIERS. Walkerville Firm Appeals To Women To Come And Sew.

Windsor, Ont., March 8.—The Peabody Company, Walkerville, which has a contract for making 200,000 pairs of trousers for British soldiers, has sent out an appeal to any woman or girl who can sew by hand to come to the factory and assist in getting out the work, which calls for 5,000 a day.

Many married women of the border municipalities have given their services, desiring it as an act of patriotism, as the sooner the trousers are made the sooner the men can get to the firing line. Several wives of volunteers are working at the plant now. Everybody who works at the plant is well paid for their efforts.

Napanee

Napanee, March 8.—The strain under which those who were connected with the now famous Tamworth tragedy, has been very great, particularly with the relatives of the actual participants. This was shown very clearly when W. C. York, a brother of the deceased girl, became hysterical and collapsed, after the trial was over. Mr. York was carried to a bed in the Paisley House, and a doctor was called to treat him, and he is now very much better.

An epidemic of mumps has broken out among the pupils of the high school. About fifteen pupils and one of the teachers have been affected so far.

An automobile party from Kingston ran foul of the local police, but luckily for them there was one of them who was capable of handling the car, and they were allowed to go with a caution.

Owing to illness, Dr. Snow did not lecturally at the Hise Memorial Hall last night, his place being taken by Dr. W. L. Miller, Toronto University, whose subject was "War and Militarism."

Another old resident of Napanee has passed away in the person of Mrs. William Embury, who died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. E. B. McKay, Toronto, on Thursday. The remains were brought here on Saturday, and buried in the family plot in the River Side Cemetery. Deceased was 62 years of age, and a daughter, Mrs. M. Easton, at one time treasurer of Napanee, with Cummings and Davis, blacksmiths, who recently sold their business to A. O. Line, has purchased the shop and business of H. Savage, opposite Trinity Church, and will continue to carry on the horse-drawing and general blacksmith business, conducted by Mr. Savage, for so many years.

A distressing accident occurred here Thursday evening when Mrs. Helen Lee, who keeps a boarding house on Robert street, fell down the cellar stairs in her home. Assistance was quickly called and two men, who were passing, went in and carried the unfortunate woman upstairs. A doctor was called in immediately, but life was extinct.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Helen Lee, took place Sunday afternoon. Services were held in Grace Methodist Church, of which the deceased was a member. The sermon was preached by Rev. C. E. Cragg. Deceased was fifty-eight years of age. She is survived by one brother, Charles Embury, and a sister, Mrs. The Belleville Ladies Hockey team came down to Napanee to play the Napanee Ladies team, and defeated the local girls by a score of 15 to 0.

The police were called to Deseronto road yesterday to disperse some tramps who were making themselves obnoxious to the residents there.

The members of the Overseas detachments and the Boy Scouts, marched to the Presbyterian Church Sunday morning to listen to a message from Rev. Dr. Howard, who is taking a great interest in doing of the soldiers and of the Scout movement.

The services of St. Mary Magdalene Church were of unusual interest Sunday. There was a very good congregation at the morning service.

The following clergy assisted in the service: Rev. C. E. St. Ratiffe, Deseronto; Rev. W. Irwin, Selkirk; Rev. S. Lindsay, St. George's Cathedral, Kingston, and Rev. T. Coleman, Napanee. The ordination sermon was preached by Canon Fitzgerald, his subject being "The Christian Ministry."

The bishop, who dealt with in a very able and inspiring manner, admitted into the membership of the church, eleven persons. The choir, under the leadership of J. W. Ashton, helped very much to make the services successful.

March 8.—The provincial ballist took to the Central Prison yesterday John Dillon and Henry King, recently sentenced to one year and six months, respectively, for stealing a suit of clothes from A. Day, Napanee.

On Saturday afternoon, in the town hall, the Napanee Rifle Society was in a quiting way, and also dispensed tea and light refreshments. The proceeds were in aid of the work of the Society.

What might have been a serious accident to one of the local soldiers happened on Saturday evening. Pe Wilson was instructed one of the recruits how to take his bayonet off the rifle. It was hard to come off

and Wilson gave an extra pull, when it came away suddenly, striking him in the face, the point of the bayonet entering his face just below the right eye, striking the bone, making a bad cut. A fraction of an inch more and it would have entered his eye. First aid was rendered until a doctor arrived to dress the wound.

There is a rumor going around to the effect that some outside parties are contemplating erecting an opera house in Napanee. Citizens would be glad to see a start made along this line, as the town has not a building which could be used for this purpose since the Brisbane Opera House burnt down some eighteen months ago.

Miss Charlotte Sanderson, dressmaker, West street, fell and broke her ankle on the sidewalk on Bridge street Saturday afternoon.

Miss Henrietta Evershed, Picton, died suddenly on Monday. Miss Evershed was the youngest daughter of E.
