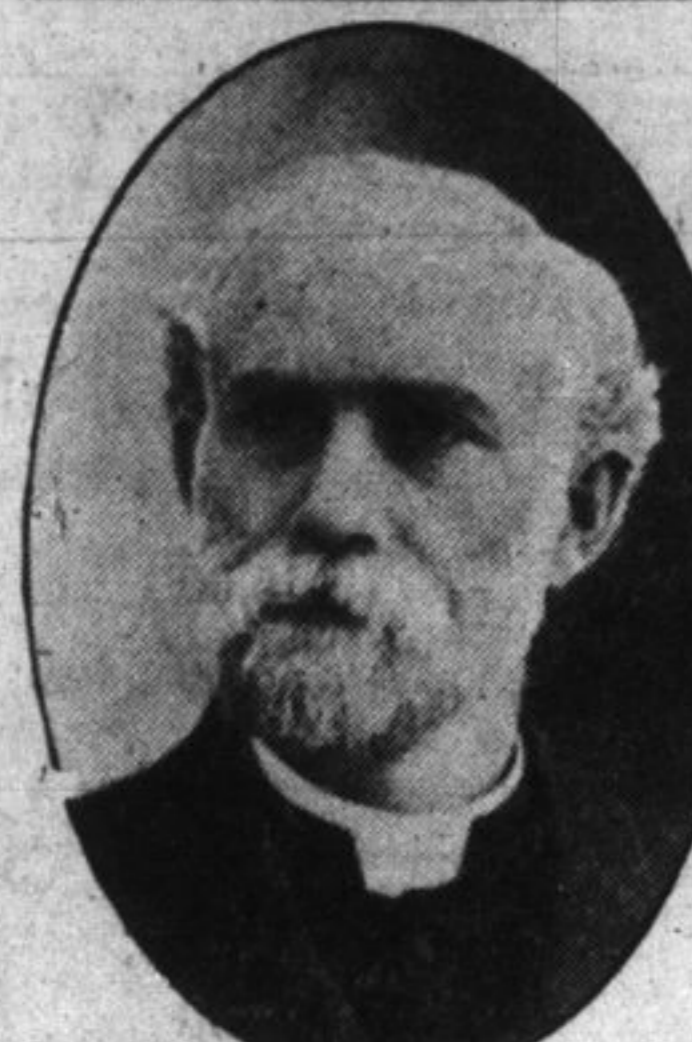
As Its Candidate For General Assembly Moderatorship.

PASSES A RESOLUTION

Steers, elders of John Street Church, Belleville, Shannonville, Napawan, etc.

Afternoon Session. When the Kingston Presbytery resumed its session on Tuesday afternoon, Rev. Henry Gracey, Gananoque, submitted a report of the home missions and appointments, as recommended, which was adopted.

To Enter Ministry. Prof. Alexander Laird, convener of the committee on the superintendence and examination of students, submitted a report.

committee wished to acknowledge the active co-operation and help of the members of Queen's University Missionary Association. A committee from this association met with the committee at its regular meeting, and held conference with it on various occasions.

Delegates to Assembly. The following were elected as commissioners to the meeting of the general assembly, which will be held in Kingston, in June:

- Ministers—Prof. Wallace, Prof. Dall, Rev. H. G. Steers, R. R. No. 1, Rev. Dr. Macgillivray, Principal Gordon, Kingston, Rev. A. M. Little, Tamworth; Rev. Henry Gracey, Gananoque. Elders—James Gordon, Napawan; W. Macintosh, Madoc; Alexander Dickson, Camden East; with the elders of Chalmers, St. Andrew's, Chalmers and Coates Churches, Kingston.

On motion of Rev. Dr. Macgillivray, seconded by Rev. Dr. Howard, the resignation of Rev. F. S. Dowling, pastor of the Redeemer, Deseronto, was accepted with much regret, especially in view of the fact that his resignation was found necessary through the illness of Mrs. Dowling. The wish was expressed that Mrs. Dowling would soon be restored to good health.

A letter was received from Rev. Dr. Macgie, former pastor of St. Andrew's Church, asking to be placed on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' fund.

Arrangements were made for the Presbytery to meet on the afternoon of April 29th, at 2.30, at Chalmers Church, to receive the names of candidates seeking license, another meeting to be held in the evening for the granting of the licenses.

When the Kingston Presbytery resumed its session on Tuesday afternoon, Rev. Henry Gracey, Gananoque, submitted a report of the home missions and appointments, as recommended, which was adopted.

The report showed the total amount contributed by the Presbytery of Kingston to home missions was \$5,444. The total amount received by the Presbytery for augmenting charges was \$2,216.20. The total amount received for missions was \$1,957.70; total received, \$4,173, leaving a balance of \$1,271. These recommendations were made:

- Augmented charges, Amherst Island, \$250; Deseronto, \$350; Elginville, \$275; Glenvale, \$325; Melrose, \$275; Newburg, \$300; Tamworth, \$200; Tweed, \$100; Newburgh supply, \$4 per week \$104. Total \$2,440. Home Missions—Carlton, (if needed) \$2 per week; Concession, \$4; Ernestown, \$8; L'Amable, \$4; Lavan, \$5; Portmouth, \$4; Harriet \$5; Tibborne, \$6; Wolfe, \$6; Hybla, \$4; Fuller, \$6; Hay Bay \$4.

The following appointments were recommended for the different fields: Carlou, J. M. Laird; Concession, W. A. Irwin, Ernestown, H. V. Wirke; Hybla, Rev. D. Fiske; L'Amable, H. B. Campbell; Lavan, W. J. McPadden; Portmouth, Rev. J. Dawson; Tharret, W. E. Banerman; Tibborne, G. B. Fraser. Wolfe Island, A. B. Morrison, Newburg; John Murray. All the appointments are for six months, with the exception of Rev. John Dawson, of Portmouth.

The committee also recommended that Hay Bay continue under the care of the pastor at Napawan; that Queen's University Missionary Society be requested to assume responsibility for the supply, during the winter months of such mission fields within the bonds of the Presbytery, as the home missionary committee of the Presbytery shall assign to them at the beginning of the season.

Rev. D. Fiske was appointed to the charge of the Hybla field till September 30th. That a grant of one dollar per Sunday, be asked for Hay Bay, supplied from Napawan. Rev. F. S. Dowling, of Deseronto, was called upon to report for the young people's societies, but pointed out that he had been unable to secure all the necessary statistics, due to the fact that the forms sent out by him had not been filled out. In view of this fact, Mr. Dowling suggested that the new convener of the committee endeavor to get a fuller report. Mr. Dowling was thanked for the endeavors he had been putting forth. The Presbytery took up the question of the Young People's Society, Union, Mr. McIntosh, Napawan, president of the Union, a stirring address, appealing to the ministers to stir up interest in the work among the young people, and to endeavor to get a large attendance, at the annual meeting of the Union, to be held in Napawan, on Good Friday. Circular letters will be sent to all the ministers, asking them to take up the matter.
