ASKING LEGISLATURE TO CUR-TAIL SALE OF LIQUOR

During the Progress Of the War Students Volunteer For Missionary Work-Committees Appointed Delegates To General Assembly.

"That inasmuch as temperance has grown rapidly during the past few years, and inasmuch as our dominion is now at war, and inasmuch as every effort should be made to conserve our national resources; and inasmuch as the liquor traffic is a great economic waste and national burden, and inasmuch as the Premier af the Province has intimated his intention of introducing temperance legislature; This Presbytery would respectfully urge the legislature to pass the largest possible measure of prohibition, this to remain in force during the continuance of the war.

The above resolution, moved by Rev. Dr. W. S. MacTavish, Madoc, and seconded by Rev. A. J. McMullin, McDonald's Corners, was adopted at the Tuesday evening session of the Kingston Presbytery.

Following up his resolution, Dr. MacTavish referred to the stand taken by Russia on the temperance question. This country, with a popula-tion of 170,000,000 people had adopted prohibition; and the system had been found to work out most satis-


