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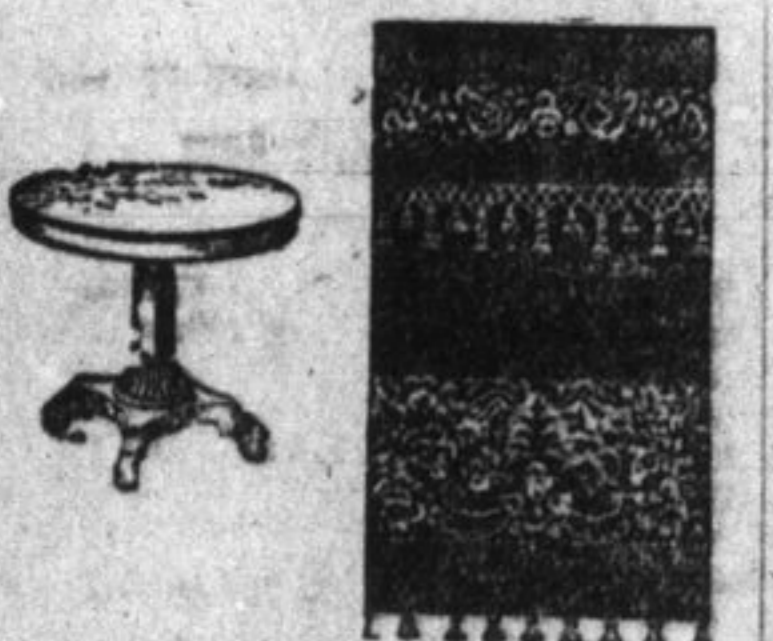

IN MILITARY CIRCLES

FORTY TORONTO STUDENTS TO COME TO KINGSTON

For Preliminary Artillery Training—Pte. E. A. Torrance, a Queen's Student, With Canadian Mounted Rifles On Firing Line.

A motor transport training school has been started in Toronto, and it has been thought that one might be started in Kingston, but this will not be done. The few overseas volunteers for this kind of work will be trained in either Toronto or Montreal.

The "C" Battery, R.C.H.A., recruits on Wednesday were given instruction in harnessing and on Thursday morning a gun-team was used. The riding has improved wonderfully, and it is expected that next week a mounted parade will be in orders.

Summer caps have been issued to the battery, instead of fur caps.

Lieut. Dewey has been attached to No. 2 detachment, P.A.S.C.

Letters have been received from Capt. Craig at Quebec, saying that the class is progressing rapidly. It is expected that this A.S.C. class will go overseas with the 21st Battalion.

Lieut. Ross, A.S.C., was in Belleville on Wednesday.

Col. S. J. A. Denison, brigadier, arrived in the city on Thursday afternoon to make an inspection of the 21st Battalion.

G. L. Reyman next Monday evening will give an illustrated address in the militia Y.M.C.A. hall on "Holland and Germany Before the War." On Tuesday evening, the choir of Princess Street Methodist Church will give a musical programme.

Capt. A. E. Bywater has been appointed major in the 49th Regiment, Vice-Major C. M. Wallbridge retired.

Chaplain and Honorary Captain, Rev. Dr. W. T. Herridge, moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, has been appointed as honorary lieutenant-colonel.

Capt. W. H. Craig, 14th Regiment has been granted a field-officer's certificate.

Lieut. E. James, 49th Regiment, has been granted a captain's certificate.

Lieuts. G. P. Reiffenstein, R. G. H. Travers, T. Keen and A. C. Trousdale have been granted military qualifications.

Capt. Trousdale, 47th Regiment, is attached to the 21st Battalion.

Gentlemen Cadet, E. K. Stewart, Royal Military College, has been granted military qualifications.

Lieut. G. L. Drew, 33rd Battery, has been granted a lieutenant's certificate in the R.S.A.

Pte. E. A. Torrance, son of James Torrance, M.P.F., for North Perth, twenty-eight years of age, and an undergraduate of Queen's University has been transferred from the 75th Field Artillery of Nova Scotia to the Royal Canadian Mounted Rifles, and is now on the firing line.

Forty students are to be recruited from Toronto university at once for

the artillery. The plan at present is to give them a training in Kingston, subsequently sending them over to practice on field guns in England.

The township of Augusta in Glengarry township has voted \$50 to the fund to buy field kitchens for the 21st Battalion. Capt. S. M. Gray has done a great deal in raising money for this purpose, over \$700 coming through his energies. Pictou reported a large amount on Thursday morning.

Capt. Sparky, transport officer for the battalion, who is now in England, in answer to an inquiry wired back the reply that the Canadian field kitchens were by far the best class for the work in Europe, and strongly recommended purchasing Canadian kitchens for the 21st Battalion.

Sergt. Bongard, No. 4 company, Sergt. Sleeth, No. 2 company, Corpl. Cunningham and Ptes. Roberts, Girron, Ingram, McIntosh left at noon on Thursday for Quebec to complete their armorer's course at the Ross Rifle factory.

Lieut. White will be attached to No. 2 company for duty. Lieut. Raymond will take over the duties of Machine Gun Officer until further notice.

Two companies of the 21st Battalion were at the ranges at Barriefield on Thursday morning. The shooting of the battalion has reached a high standard.

Capt. A. McParland has been appointed to the 25th Battery, 7th Brigade, C.E.F. Major V. A. Hall, Peterboro, and Capt. K. B. Carruthers have been appointed officers in the 25th Battery, C.E.F., which will be mobilized here, and Capt. W. Hartly has been appointed to the ammunition column of the 7th Brigade at Ottawa. All these officers are graduates of the Royal Military College, and will go overseas with the artillery division.

Capt. McBride, 38th Regiment, Brantford, and Lieut. A. U. Gilmour, 43rd D.C.O.R., Ottawa, who have been attached to the 21st Battalion for instruction and duty, returned to their regiments on Thursday.

Lieut. W. F. Smith and Lieut. S. M. Waldron, 5th Kingston Battery have been promoted to captains.

Nothing official has yet been given out about the Militia department accepting Queen's offer of the personnel of a Stationary Hospital, but it is understood that the offer will be accepted. Major P. Etherington was in Ottawa on Wednesday consulting with the Minister of Militia on the matter.

The 4th Hussars recruits left on Tuesday for Ottawa in command of Major J. F. Leatherland to join with others, and go overseas as the 8th Regiment, Canadian Mounted Rifles.

The report brought to the notice of the board the fact that, owing to the increase in the number of patients being treated and the work done, in the near future, when funds would allow, it would be necessary to provide more accommodation, especially the enlargement of the present kitchen and dining-room.

There are now twenty-three patients in residence, two of whom are about to return to their homes, being considered cured.

The patients and staff of the hospital are indebted to the press of Kingston for copies of the daily papers which have now been sent regularly to the hospital for some time.
