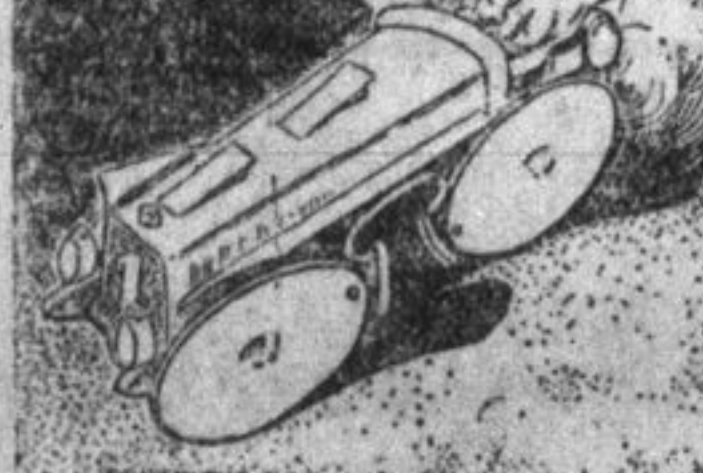

THE SPORT REVIEW

NO SUNDAY BASEBALL IN MONTREAL THIS YEAR.

Stanley Cup Arrives Back in Ottawa—Seeley's Bay Hockey Team Went Through Season Without a Defeat.
Winnipeg Monarchs and Melville will now battle for possession of the Allan Cup on Melville ice.

Toronto Mail-Emire: The O.H.A. rules seem to suit Western teams better than their own. It demonstrated this fact Monday night against Vics, as the Winnipeg Vics did against Eastons when they beat the latter by 16 to 1.

The N.H.A. race was one of the closest in the history of the league. At no time during the season were the Ottawas more than one game ahead of the Wanderers.

The \$2,500 purse gag is again working in the New York papers in connection with a visit of some of the pro hockey teams to the St. Nicholas rink. The Montreal Wanderers say that expenses and \$5 a game for seven games was their share of the "\$2,500 purse" last year.

Varsity-H. who are champions of the intercollegiate section of the Intermediate O.B.A., have notified the association that they will not participate in the finals of the league owing to the early commencement of exams this year.

The Seeley's Bay hockey team has the honor of going through the season without a defeat. The two last matches were played with Phillipsville and the result gave them the championship of the Leeds County League and possession of the Seeley's Bay Cup. The team is composed of R. Moore, goal; H. Smith and D. Moore, defence; E. Chapman, rover; S. Moore, centre; L. E. Smith, and W. Warren, wings.

The Stanley Cup is back in Ottawa again. It arrived from Toronto and was turned over to William Foran, the trustee, who had requested the Toronto, to send it along. It will repose for a time at least in Mr. Foran's office.

The Stanley Cup still bears many marks of the battering it received in the hands about the Dominion, though it was turned over to the jewelers and given considerable attention a year or two ago when a new base and ring were added.

It is quite possible that the Royals will not stage any Sunday games in Montreal next summer. President Lichtenheim has been unable to make satisfactory arrangements regarding playing grounds for the Sunday games and now plans to stage double-headers on Saturdays instead of playing Sunday games. There are only twelve Sunday games scheduled in Montreal and rain causes the postponement of an average of four of the Sunday games. The rent for the grounds being high, President Lichtenheim thinks it would therefore be more profitable to play double-headers on Saturdays instead of playing the Sunday games.

TIMES TALKS OF CRISIS.

Disadvantages From Loss Of Great Opportunity.

London, March 11.—The Times, in an editorial on the Greek crisis, says: "Many events more important to Greece and the other Balkan states than changes of ministers are likely to happen within a month, which will elapse before the Greek Chamber dissolves. The ministerial crisis in Greece is still, in some respects obscure, but its main cause is well known."

"It is remarkable that the chief of the Greek general staff, General Doumamis, who was suspended in January for an attack upon Premier Venizelos, was restored to his functions on the very day that the committee of former premiers was summoned by the king to consider the Cabinet crisis. He attended this committee meeting last Friday."

"The whole story of what took place at the meeting remains to be disclosed, but all Athens knows that on Saturday morning M. Venizelos visited the British legation, where the French and Russian ministers were present. That night the cabinet resigned. The obvious inference is that King Constantine disapproved the policy for which the cabinet had secured the assent of the council. Had Venizelos not carried the council with him he would hardly have wished to meet the representatives of the Entente powers after the council meeting had risen."

"M. Venizelos is too sagacious and well informed to entertain or encourage aspirations on the part of Greece for the possession of Constantinople, but he is permeated with a deep consciousness of the ties binding the Greeks to Byzantium and could hardly consent to stand idly by while strangers forced the Dardanelles and strange troops drove the Turks from the walls which defended Greek nationality. Greek faith and Greek learning for more than a thousand years."

The article proceeds to argue that the King of Greece may not be unwilling for personal reasons connected with his obligations to the German Emperor, to see his own policy overborne by the natural demand for return to power of Venizelos, and says it is not likely that he will lightly risk the loss of national favor by permanently disowning the statesman of Greece for adopting an avowedly a thoroughly national policy.

"At the same time," the editorial concludes, "while the advantages of a stop-gap ministry are clear from a family and personal standpoint, its disadvantages from the loss of Greece's opportunity are equally clear."
