DEATH OF E. C. WALKER  
Son Of Founder Of Big Distillery  
Passes Away.  
Windsor, Ont., March 12.—News reached here of the death in Washington, D.C., of E. C. Walker, Walkerville, Ontario, and son of the late Hiram Walker, founder of Walkerville's distillery. He left only ten days ago, in company with Mrs. Walker, to visit the latter's sister in Washington. He had been in failing health for some time, but his condition was thought to be serious, and the announcement of his death came as a shock to the people of Windsor and Walkerville, where he was very well known. Mr. Walker was born and educated in Detroit and was about sixty-four years of age.

DEATH OF MAJOR DOUGLAS  
Prominent P. V. Years in Militia Circles.  
Windsor, March 12.—Major J. W. Douglas, Perth, died here last night at the residence of Archibald McNeil, Victoria avenue, where with Mrs. Douglas he had been making his home for several months. Death was due to a general breakdown. He was seventy-five years of age.  
For many years Major Douglas was a prominent figure in Canadian militia circles. At the time of his retirement he was senior major of the 42nd Perth Regiment. Besides the wife, he is survived by three sons. The remains will be taken to Perth for burial.

### WELSH CHURCH BILL

Comment On Compromise To Defer Giving It Effect.  
London, March 12.—The compromise which has been arrived at whereby the Welsh Church Bill will not become operative until six months after the end of the war, is approved of by the press of both political parties. The tone of the Opposition organs is that the Government is only going on an act of common justice.  
The Yorkshire Post admits that the concession obtained is largely due to the feeling of the Non-Con-formists against the disendowment proposals.  
Welsh members are strongly op-posing, but the Manchester Guardian, a northern Radical exponent, thinks the Welsh people will accept the situation as Premier Asquith has done, adding that the nation, in fact, is not in any mood to waste many words over the malcontents on either side just now.  
The Morning Post and the Daily News present extremist views, the former emphasizing the eleventh hour concession while the latter taunts the Opposition with the hope of finding the horns of Liberalism watered before the Legislature becomes effective.
