

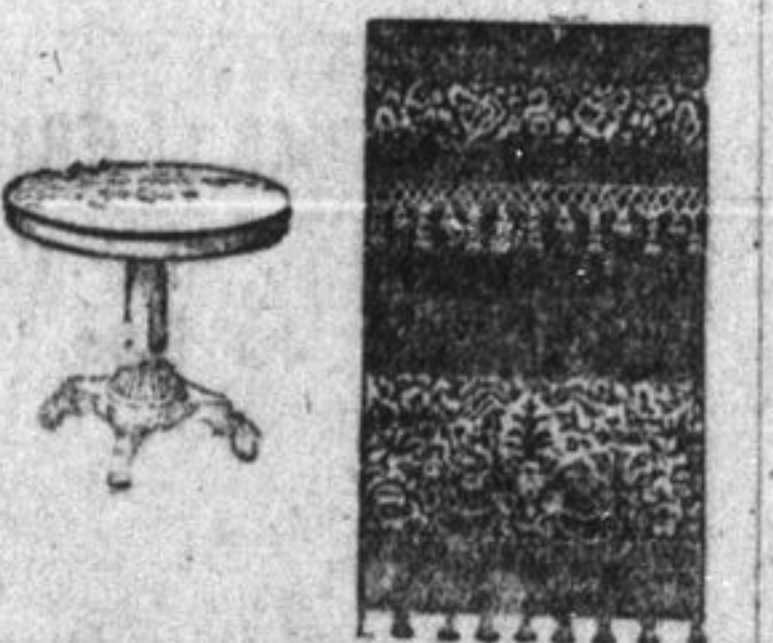

THE COLLEGIATES LOST PASSED MEXICAN BILL LIFE IN THE TRENCHES

THE FIRST OF THE JUNIOR INTERCOLLEGIATE FINALS.

At Port Hope on Monday Night By 7 Goals to 2—Final Game Will Be Played Here on Wednesday Night.

At Port Hope on Monday night, Trinity College defeated Kingston Collegiates in the first of the final games for the junior intercollegiate championship, by 7 goals to 2. The return game will be played here on Wednesday night, when Collegiates hope to overcome the lead and take the championship. Port Hope had an advantage on its small rink. Referee Rowden was not capable of handling the game, for the reason that he could not skate at a fast enough pace to follow the play. There were two disputed goals, which were allowed for the Port Hope team. The score was 2 to 0 in the first period, and 2 to 2 in the second. The game was fast throughout.

Trinity College has a good team, and it will take the Collegiates all their time at full steam to overcome the lead of five goals the Port Hope seven has secured. Morris and Rice were the stars of the home team, and Ferguson, J. Stewart, H. Toland and W. Paul were the most conspicuous Collegiates. Port Hope—Goal, Wigle; defense, Morris and Rice; rover, Reid; centre, Sutherland; right wing, Fowler; left wing, Thetford.

THE LATE W. J. MAHOOD,

An Aged Citizen Died on Tuesday Morning.

W. J. Mahood, one of Kingston's oldest and most highly respected citizens, passed peacefully away at the General Hospital early Tuesday morning, after an illness of only a few days' duration.
The late Mr. Mahood was born in Ballymena, Ireland, in 1834. He came to Canada and settled in Kingston in 1861, and lived in this city ever since.
For thirty years the deceased was well known on Princess street, having founded the business now known under the name of Mahood Brys. He retired in 1892.
The late Mr. Mahood was a lifelong member of Chalmers Church, joining under the pastorate of the late Rev. Patrick Gray. He is survived by a wife; three daughters, Mrs. J. E. Wilmot, Ottawa; Mrs. Arthur Mc-Nicol, Toronto, and Miss Bertha, at home; and four sons, Perry, S. George W., Frederick K., all of Kingston, and Dr. A. E., Ottawa.
The funeral will take place from the family residence, 105 Johnson street, on Thursday afternoon at two o'clock to Cataract cemetery.

IT IS ALLEGED STOREKEEPER WAS VICTIM OF FRAUD.

Saturday Night Alleged Stranger Tendered Bill for Plug of Tobacco and Was Given Change—Discovery Made Monday.

It would be wise for Kingston merchants to look out for Mexican \$5 bills, which have been put in circulation.
On Monday afternoon the police were notified that a man had passed one of the bills at Donnelly's grocery store, on Wellington street. The bill is only worth \$1.50 in Canadian money. The man who presented the bill was a stranger at the store. He bought a ten-cent plug of tobacco, and received his change, but it was not until Monday that it was discovered that he had given a Mexican bill. Then the police were notified.

Some few days ago there was a report about several of these bills being in circulation in Western Ontario cities and towns, but this is the first report the Kingston police have had about them being circulated here. Constable Samuel Arnel, to whom the case was reported, now has the bill in his possession.
The stranger, so it is alleged, dropped one of the bills in the store, either by mistake or intentionally. This was picked up by a party who was in the store some time after the man left.

The man who passed the bill is described as being about five feet eight inches in height, and weighing about 150 pounds. It is believed that at the time he was in the store he wore a false moustache.

When Saint Patrick first preached the Christian faith in Ireland before a powerful chief, and his people, speaking of one God and of the Trinity, the chief asked how one could be in three. The shamrock closely resembles the Canadian white clover.

PORTSMOUTH BOY RELATES HIS EXPERIENCES.

"Germans Are Up To All Kinds Of Tricks, But We Are Not Asleep," Writes Thomas Smith—They Are Having Fine Weather.

"The Germans are up to all kinds of tricks, but we are not asleep," writes Thomas Smith, Portsmouth, a member of the First Contingent, to his brother, Joseph Smith.
"We are having our time here. We have been in the trenches twice and a few of our lads were wounded. The Germans are out snipers, and if they get the slightest chance they will get you sure. When we were in the trenches we were from five hundred to five hundred and fifty yards from the Germans, so you can tell just how fast the bullets came whizzing over our heads. All you can hear is 'ding-ding!' The Germans are up to all sorts of tricks, such as putting straw in their hats, and crawling out and getting into bars, making holes in the walls, and shooting down into the trenches. But we are not asleep, and are just as foxy as any of the Germans."
"All the Portsmouth boys are feeling fine, apart from having sore feet. The boots we have are hard on the feet. We have done a great deal of marching, lately, but I blame the boots, as I never had sore feet before. We are having nice weather just now. It is just like spring, and there is not as much mud as we had at Salisbury Plain. This is the kind of weather they have been waiting for. There is sure to be something doing, and I hope that we will be able to show them what the boys from over the pond can do."

In England On February 25th.
