SHIRTINGS GIVE FULLNESS

Plats or shirtings to give fullness at the hips is one of the styles that are taking well. In a new coat model a plated panel is set in over each hip, extending to the bottom of the coat and the top is covered by the belt at the waist line. The same idea of side fullness is carried out in a skirt model. The yoke of the skirt is round and the lower section is cut on circular lines and put on the yoke evenly, except for six inches at each hip, where the lower section is shirred to the yoke, giving an attractive fullness in novel way.
