GERMANS PLEAD "NOT GUILTY."

Charged With Conspiracy to Violate Laws.

New York, March 17.—Carl Buecz, director of the Hamburg-American Line, enters a plea of not guilty before Judge Edward D. Cushman in the United States District court to two indictments charging him with participating in a conspiracy to violate the customs laws in such a way as to obtain clearance papers for vessels sent out by the Hamburg-American Line to coal and provision German warships. He was represented by Attorney William Hand, and held in \$5,000 bail until next Monday, when he will be expected to enter his permanent plea. Mr. Buecz was indicted with the Hamburg-American Line; George Koester, general superintendent of the line; Walter Pappenhans, a shipping agent and Ellis Buffington, one of the super-cargoes, who were assigned by the line to be chartered ships to guide the course of the boats so as to meet the warships at scheduled places. All have entered pleas of not guilty so far, except Reifner, who is at sea.

Break Coming Between Italy and Austria

(Special to the Whig.)

Rome, March 17.—Runners of important developments in the Balkans today divided attention in diplomatic circles with reports that Austria and Italy are making a break. Anti-Austrian demonstrations were again reported from a number of Italian cities to-day. Unquestionably the warlike utterances of that portion of the press favoring the Allies is stirring up strong sentiment in favor of war. On the other hand, leaders who have consistently urged the maintenance of Italy's neutrality have, not been without success.
