

FREEDOM FROM CRIME

WAS COMMENTED UPON BY THE GRAND JURY.

Recommended Free Water For the Hotel Dieu and the General Hospital—Conditions At the Jail.

The Grand Jury, empaneled at the Supreme Court, sitting presided over by Justice Britton, reported as follows on their inspection of charitable institutions in the city:

"We congratulate the county on the freedom from crime. On our visit to the jail we found the buildings well kept, clean and sanitary. There are at present confined to the jail seventeen male and four female. There are no cases of sickness to report, and no complaints from officials nor prisoners. The male prisoners are chiefly engaged in the manufacture of tile, a large supply of which is now on hand to be sold to the municipalities in the county. At the penitentiary we were courteously received by the Warden Creighton. The Grand Jury were highly pleased with commodious and sanitary sleeping apartments provided for the convicts.

"We visited the Hotel Dieu and General Hospital and found them, as usual, models of cleanliness and efficiency. The Grand Jury recommend that these institutions be given free water by the city, and that the present financial assistance given by the county be not reduced.

"At the House of Industry we found the inmates comfortable and well cared for.

"We desire to call attention at this particular crisis on the Empire's history to the strong patriotic spirit prevalent among all classes in this city and the prompt responses made to the demand for recruits. The 21st Battalion in particular, which has been mobilized and trained here, exhibits a type of manhood of which we might greatly be proud. We would like also to emphasize the fact that since the outbreak of war, there has been a decrease in the more serious crimes as well as that of petty crimes."
