AUTHORITY TO BANKS DIVIDED LEGISLATURE

TO LOAN MONEY FOR PURCHASE OF SEED GRAIN.
Legislation Submitted By Hon. W. T. White—The Bill Extends From March 15th Until August 1st.
(Special to the Whig.)
Ottawa, March 20.—Canadian banks are to be authorized temporarily to loan money for the purchase of seed grain. The security of the grain purchased and the grain to be grown therefrom and the grain to be sold therefrom will be deemed to be sufficient.
Hon. W. T. White, Minister of Finance, submitted legislation at yesterday afternoon's sitting of Parliament as an amendment to the Bank Act. The amendment is to be deemed to have come into force on the 15th day of the present month, and it expires on August 1st next.
Sir Wilfrid Laurier pointed out that many efforts had been made to secure the amendment proposed. The matter was not free from doubt, but he had never seen why it could not be done. The present proposal was temporary and the Government would be able to judge from experience whether it might not be made permanent.
The Minister of Justice also moved a resolution upon which a bill will be based to provide for the extension of licenses of insurance companies which may expire before the end of next session. Mr. Doherty said there had been many applications, and under existing war and financial conditions he thought it was right that such a charter should be extended.
Sir Wilfrid Laurier stated that the Peace Centennial Committee was considering a proposal to erect monuments to Parkman at Ottawa, Queen Victoria at Washington and George Washington in London. The Liberal leader observed that the Postmaster-General probably had this in mind when he objected to the view that Parkman was the greatest historian of Canadian events.

REV. DR. MILLIGAN ASKS.
Presbyterian General Assembly To Elect Dr. MacGillivray Moderator
Writing in The Presbyterian, Rev. G. M. Milligan, D.D., Toronto, says: "Prudence sometimes indicates silence as the condition of safety in life. It is sometimes hard to maintain it and sometimes unprofitable. I find it so in view of the coming Assembly to be held in Kingston next June. Kingston is an old historic centre of Presbyterianism and yet, at least since the union of the church in 1875, no minister in her pulpit has been asked to fill the Moderator's chair, although the Assembly has been held there repeatedly. The church has an opportunity to do now what cannot come to her again for perhaps many a day.
"Dr. MacGillivray has been in the ministry about forty years and in his present charge in Chalmers church, Kingston, for twenty-eight years, and wonderfully fruitful years they have been. In the early vital years of Queen's Alumni Association, beginning in the early nineties, he was one of the most illuminating and suggestive contributors and has continued so all along. He has been for many years a trustee of the Moderator of the Presbyterian bear witness to many stirring and instructive articles from his pen. No one can be long with him without coming to the impression that his knowledge is rare in quality and in range not met with every day.
"This is not the first time that changes in selecting a Moderator have been made at the eleventh hour, indeed at the very opening of the Assembly. Why should it not be so now? All that is required is a willing mind on the part of the Kingston Presbytery to see that he is a member of the coming Assembly, and on the part of the members of Assembly delighting to honor the old Limestone City for once and a man noted for his modesty, ability and spirit as an honor to the ministry dear to us all. Others can wait, but in the case of the Kingston name it is now or never to do the fitting thing."

NUMBER OF VESSELS SUNK
By Enemy's Ships or Mines Since the War Began.
(Special to the Whig.)
London, March 20.—In an official statement to-day, the Admiralty announced that from the beginning of the war until March 17th fifty-four British merchant vessels have been sunk or captured by enemy cruisers. Twelve have been sunk by mines and thirty by submarines. Twenty-eight British fishing vessels have been destroyed by mines. In the same period the arrivals and sailings of vessels of all nationalities at British ports total 42,284, the Admiralty announces.
