GOING TO THE FRONT.

Lieut. James O'Reilly, Commands, Detachment of A. S. C. Cornwall, March 20.—James O'Reilly, Winnipeg came up from Quebec to pay a hurried visit to his parents, Judge and Mrs. O'Reilly, Cornwall. He is in command of a detachment numbering 75, of the Army Service Corps, raised in Winnipeg for service at the front, their duties being the obtaining, transport and distribution of provisions and supplies of all kinds to the soldiers at the front. They left Winnipeg on Wednesday, and for a short time will be engaged in perfecting their equipment, expecting to go to England towards the end of the month, where they will be further trained in the special duties required of them in the field. Lieut. O'Reilly is a distinguished graduate of the Royal Military College, Kingston, and has given up a prominent position in the C. P. R. to serve his King and country. He looks every inch a soldier, and he is small one at that, and may be depended upon to render a good account of himself in the responsible and arduous work allotted to him. He is one of the most important in the whole range of military duties in war time. His many friends in Cornwall will follow his career with interest, and hope that he may escape "the slings and arrows of outrageous fortune" and return safe and sound to Canada.

Gananoque

March 22.—Rev. Prof. G. W. Jordan, D.D., of the Faculty of Theology, Queen's University, Kingston, and Moderator of the Kingston Presbytery, preached two powerful sermons in St. Andrew's Church yesterday in commemoration of the jubilee of the pastor, Rev. Henry Gracey, who has just completed his 50th year of service for the Presbyterian Church as a minister. Rev. Father J. P. Kellie, rector of St. John's Church, preached his annual charity sermon after which a special collection was taken in aid of the Belgian Relief Fund. The morning service in Grace Methodist Church was withdrawn yesterday in order that the pastor and congregation might assist in the celebration of Rev. Henry Gracey's jubilee in the ministry. In consequence the service in St. Andrew's Church was a union one and drew out a very large congregation. Rev. Mr. Gracey has always been held in high esteem by the Methodist body of the town. The police committee's investigation into the charges preferred by Councillor George Dowsley against the local pool rooms and of alleged neglect of the local police force in enforcing the town by-laws, held Friday evening, elicited no evidence to substantiate the charges. The market was fairly well patronized both by buyers and sellers on Saturday. The prices remained at about the same figures as during the past few weeks. The labor members of the Town Council, Messrs. George Dowsley and George S. Cowie, brought in a motion at the session of the council last week to raise the wages of municipal laborers to 22 1-2 cents an hour, but on division it was defeated. Frederick Green, Montreal, an ex-Grand Trunk employee, has purchased the property of George Cross, a few miles east of the town. Mr. Green purposes locating here in the near future. Messrs. R. G. Graham and George Toner, represented Gananoque Lodge No. 247 at the session of the Grand Lodge of that order held in Toronto last week. In the Surrogate Court of the United Counties of Leeds and Grenville, probate of the will of the late James Reid, Gananoque, blacksmith, was granted to William J. Reid, his son, the executor named in the will. John Paul is superintending the construction of a government wharf at Portland.

OPINION IN PARIS.

Italy Will Make Decision When Moment For Action Comes. Paris, March 20.—Austro-Italian politics continue to attract most attention here. Opinions differ greatly about the exact nature of Prince von Bulow's negotiations, some saying he is offering Trent, and even Trieste, absolutely, and others state that these Provinces are being offered on condition that the Italian occupation be debarrd until the close of the war. The general impression persists that Italian intervention is only postponed, not prevented, by the negotiations. The Journal des Debats sums up the question as follows: "No cunning, no intrigues, can prevail against the force of circumstances. Prince von Bulow would offer definitely what Italy demands. Austria would prefer war to such a dismemberment of the empire. Italian politicians are too subtle to be delayed by words much longer. They will make their decision when the moment for action comes."

Napanee

March 22.—Another of Napanee's landmarks has passed away in the person of Blake Mowers, whose death occurred in the Kingston General Hospital on Friday last. Deceased was operated upon for cancer. He leaves one sister, Augusta. Deceased was sixty-three years of age. The funeral was held from his residence, Mill street, Monday afternoon. The firemen had a call to the tower end of the town Saturday morning. Boys had made a bonfire between the boat houses owned by A. Kinmerley and Shore Lyons, and the fire had caught on the roof. It was quickly put out. Charles Robertson, Toronto, and James Murray, St. John's (Que.), were up before Magistrate Rankin Saturday morning to answer a charge of vagrancy. They were remanded for a week. Frank Marshall, Toronto, a well-dressed young fellow, pleaded guilty to stealing Dr. Cameron Wilson's automobile. Accused said he was trying to get to Toronto from Montreal, where he had been for the past year, and was in Kingston on Thursday. He was remanded for a week. An order in Council has been passed in British Columbia prohibiting until September 30th the landing at any port of immigrants of the laboring classes, skilled or unskilled. Further demands that action be taken to protect Roman Catholic priests and nuns in Mexico City were made on the Washington State Department Saturday. Those police of Detroit who indulge in intoxicants, on or off duty, are to be discharged. Wisconsin legislators refused to prohibit the employment of girls at night work. Werner Horn was ordered held by U. S. Commissioner for trial at Boston.

LURID STORY OF THE SUDAN.

German Merchant Says Derivishes Are In Sole Possession. Berlin, March 20.—(By wireless to Sayville.)—A German merchant, who recently has returned from Egypt, authority for the declaration that the whole of the Sudan, including Khartoum, and also parts of Arabia, are in possession of the Derivishes. The statements of this traveler are published in the Vossische Zeitung. He describes also an engagement near Fashoda last December in which General Hawley, of the British army, and a number of other officers and men lost their lives. The merchant in question relates a story of the alleged uprising of the Senusli tribesmen in November. He declares that they destroyed an Australian camp near the Nile on November 19th, killing 200 Australians and capturing guns and provisions. Later, in large force, not less than 80,000, they overflew the entire province of Fayum and destroyed all railroads, including the Cairo-Assuan line.

350 GUNS PREPARED DASH.

German Trenches At Neuve Chapelle Seizured On Fire. London, March 20.—The Daily Mail quotes a letter from the Indian expeditionary force describing the capture of Neuve Chapelle. He says: "We had about 350 guns simply letting drive for all they were worth. When I wanted to make a remark to any one next to me I had to put my hands to my mouth and yell. The line of German trenches which they were shelling was perfect hell on earth; they looked as if they were on fire, so awful was the concentration of shell fire. It was one unbroken line of bursting shells. "Then the infantry dashed forward and we saw men dropping right and left. Barbed entanglements had been blown clean into the trench and over it in some places, and the trenches themselves, were simply pulp of earth and boards, wire entanglements, and bags of equipment and Germans, some only boys 14 years old."

CHASED 48,000 MILES.

Australia Finally Got German Fleet At Starbuck's Mercy. London, March 20.—Stokes from the cruiser Australia, says Reuter's Fremantle correspondent, declare that the Australia chased the German Pacific squadron 48,000 miles, using 5,000 tons of coal, and 5,000 tons of oil. The pursuit lay in the Pacific around the Samoan, Fiji and Fanning Islands, and along the coast of Mexico. Finally, the msg. say, the Germans were driven into the range of Vice-Admiral Starbuck's guns in the Atlantic off the Falkland Islands.

P.E.I. REPRESENTATION

Legislation to Fix Minimum in House of Commons. Ottawa, March 20.—The legislation which is to be introduced with regard to the parliamentary representation of the Atlantic provinces will, it is understood, provide for a minimum representation in the House of Commons equal to the fixed representation in the Senate. This would be done by a general resolution and bill, applying to all the provinces. Prince Edward Island has now four members in each house but stands to lose one member in the Commons under the redistribution. John H. Bazer, son of the founder of Hagersville, and Postmaster there for thirty-five years, died as the result of a paralytic stroke.
