G.T.P. STILL REFUSES

TO TAKE OVER THE NATIONAL TRANSCONTINENTAL.

And This Section Will Be Temporarily Operated by the Dominion Government—Notable Increase in Railway Mileage.

Ottawa, March 23.—With the National Transcontinental Railway operated temporarily by the Government, this summer will see a notable increase in operated mileage in Canada. Sir William Mackenzie, who has been in Ottawa for several days, announced that work on the Canadian Northern would proceed with the arrival of milder weather. The British Columbia lines, being close to completion and the line from Toronto to Winnipeg ready for traffic. On the sections where the laying of steel has been completed, the company would proceed with the necessary ballasting. Sir William spoke appreciatively of the high standard of construction which the Canadian Northern would be able to show when these operations were concluded.

The Transcontinental situation has not changed since the announcement that the G.T.P. were objecting to the fulfillment of their contract to operate, and that the Government would operate the line until negotiations with the company ended. The immensely increased cost of the line over the estimate given to the country by the Laurier Government at the time the contract with G. T. R. was being forced through parliament has made the question of operation one of exceeding difficulty. At the same time the contract entered into by the Laurier Government with the company affords no security to the company in the event of the company definitely refusing to operate. The estimate of interest on cost for rental purposes is 1923, when the period of free operation by the company would terminate, was given in the last railway budget at between six and seven millions.

WIND-UP AT OTTAWA.

Close Of The Session Is Not Far Away.

Ottawa, March 23.—The end of the session is now in sight. Morning and Saturday sittings commenced this week, and so far as the business of the House is concerned there is nothing to hold the members in the capital after Easter.

Ten days more should see the reports of the Post and Public Accounts Committees tabled. Rapid progress is being made with the estimates, and there will be nothing in the supplementaries to justify a halt. The War Revenue Bill will not take long, and in this connection, it is expected that the date for the collection of the war taxes will be fixed for April 1st, the first day of the new fiscal year.

JAPANESE AT TIEN TSIN.

Two Battalions Arrive To Impose Japan's Claims.

London, March 23.—Despatches from the Far East report that two battalions of Japanese soldiers were landed at Tien Ts'in on March 18th, and that the war feeling in China is growing. Several thousand Chinese of Shanghai, principally shopkeepers, on the same day demanded war, saying that they would rather die on the battlefields than be slaves to the Japanese.

The Economist, in commenting on Japan's position with reference to China as set forth in the United States, and some British newspapers, says:—

"If they are authentic, and if China has accepted anything like all the demands presented, the silence of the Foreign Office may throw a very grave danger to business interests. They constitute a most serious attack on the independence and integrity of China."

MEMEL TO BE MADE

A Russian Naval Base For Sea Attacks.

Petrograd, March 23.—Memel, the captured German port in East Prussia, will become a Russian naval base, from which sea attacks will be launched against other German coast cities as soon as navigation is again resumed in the Baltic Sea.

While Memel's fall is of no great strategic importance for a military standpoint, it is invaluable for naval operations, being only 135 miles from Danzig, Germany's strongest naval base on the Baltic.

WHI Check German Agitations.

London, March 23.—Alfred Stae, the Chinese Minister here, states that China was not aware of the explosive aims and schemes of Captain von Pappenheim, the German military attaché at Peking, when he went on his recent mission to Manchuria and Mongolia, and believed it was merely a pleasure trip instead of a scheme to destroy portions of the Russian railway. China, the Minister said, has since protested to Germany against the action of the attaché and had sent a circular letter to the authorities of Manchuria and Mongolia, directing them to stop von Pappenheim's agitation among the natives.

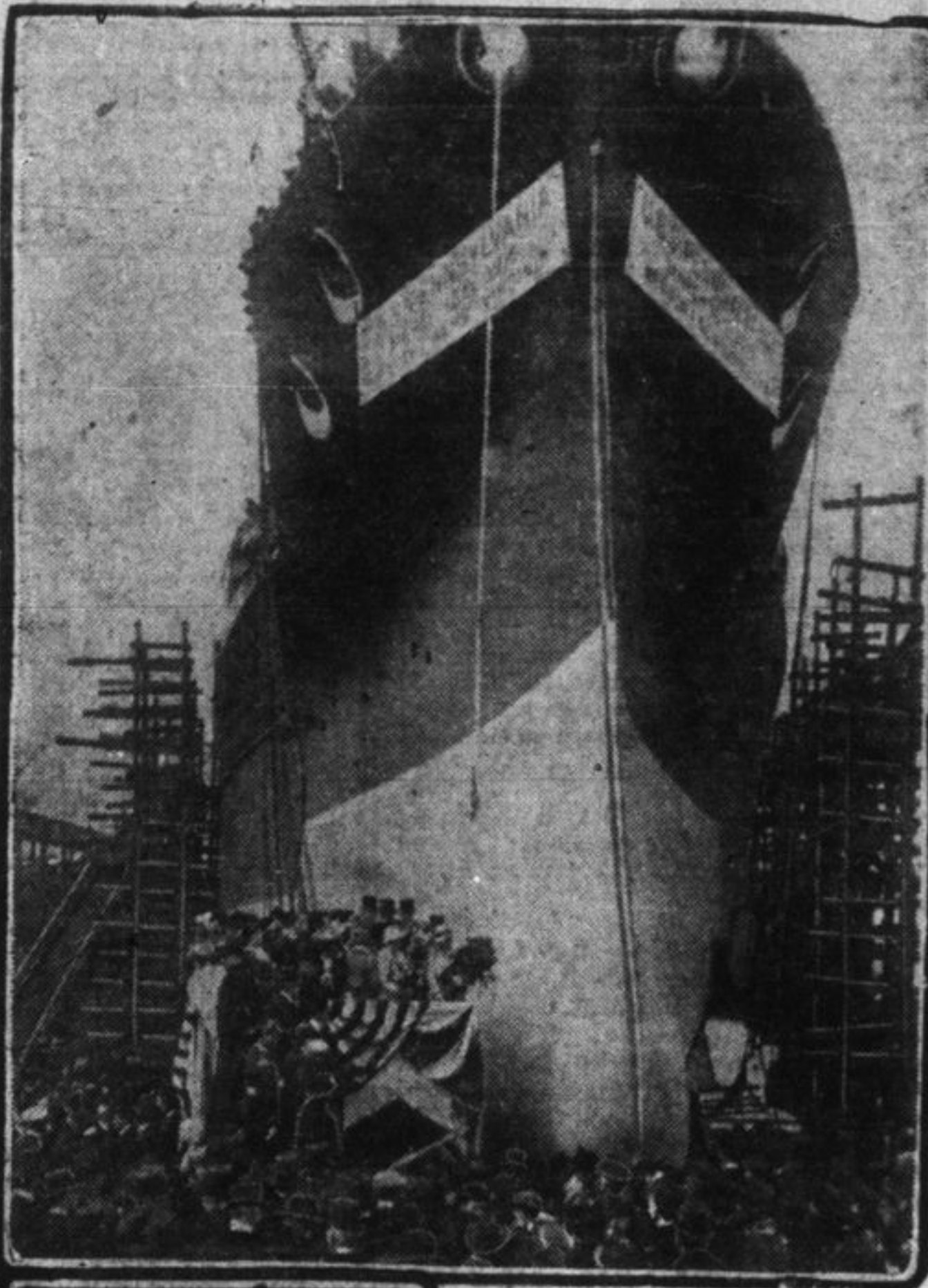
Cheaper Bread Over 'One.

A Plea For Unity.

Sir George Foster. I have but one word to say in conclusion, and that is this: To-day Canada and the Empire are engaged in a colossal contest, the inner meaning of which not one of us has an adequate idea of. But we know that that contest is on. We know that in that contest Britain and the British people are fighting for its very life. You can hear the quick, short pants of the contending forces, and you can easily translate that to the breathless vigor of an Empire in a series of nations which feel that on this long line of contests they are fighting for their very life. We are in the midst of that war. Our own friends, our own brothers, our own sons are there or soon will be.

"There is glory on the fighting line, but there is death in the fighting line as well. As we take up our papers from day to day and read that fraction of what comes to us, brings to us every day and every hour, we are to some adequate comprehension of the mighty struggle and the intense and tears and tribulation through which final victory can be won.

"What I plead for in this House, in the country everywhere, is that the best of the Dominion, Liberal as well as Tory, outside of race or of creed or of political faith, may look upon the verities of this war and may learn to value, as in only such cases we can learn to value, the comparative merits of the trial and of the absolute important. These things I plead for and as much as in us lies in this country, let us all, until that war is determined, bend our backs to the burden, putting behind what is trivial and not of moment, facing steadfastly the mighty issue in which the present and highest and best civilization that the world has seen develop, is fighting for its life and its continuance in the present and under circumstances of terrible difficulty and of terrible peril.
