CHINA CEDES JAPAN
CERTAIN RIGHTS IN MANCHURIA
—MIKADO SOFTENS DEMANDS
 Agreement Reached On Five Points
 —Theatres and Shops of Japanese Were Stopped By Mobs.
 Peking, March 25.—Five articles bearing on the Japanese demands upon China were initiated as concluded by the Chinese foreign minister, Lu Cheng-Hsiang, and Eki Hiroki, the Japanese minister, at the conference which was held at the Japanese Legation yesterday.
 The Japanese minister recently suffered slight injuries by a fall from a horse, and his condition did not permit him to go to the Chinese foreign office, and for this reason the meeting was transferred to the legation.
 All the articles concern Manchuria. China agreed to the following stipulations:
 First.—The Japanese Government's consent shall be obtained before a loan is made with a third power involving the pledging of local taxes in South Manchuria.
 Second.—The Japanese Government's consent shall be obtained whenever permission is granted to a subject of a third power to build a railway, or when a loan is made with a third power for the building of a railway in South Manchuria.
 Third.—If the Chinese Government in South Manchuria employs advisers or instructors for political, financial or military purposes the Japanese Government shall first be consulted.
 Fourth.—The transfer of the Kirin-Changchun Railway to Japanese control for ninety-nine years.
 The fifth article was proposed by China and provides for the continuation of such treaties as are not affected by the present treaty.

GOSPEL ON THE WAR.
 Justifies Right of the Sword, Says German Bishop.
 London March, 25.—The Daily News says an extraordinary address was delivered on Friday last in one of the largest halls in Berlin by the hop Paulhaber of Speyer, "one of the most notable preachers in Germany," as the Vossische Zeitung attests him. His subject was the war in the light of the Gospel, and the following are some of his statements, according to the Daily News:
 "The Gospel as a message of international love among mankind, it is true, no pleasure in the mutual massacre of nations, but the peace greeting of the Gospel is not a political truce toward men, it is religious peace toward God. Religious propaganda by means of arms is forbidden, but with the cry, lay down your arms, the Gospel has nothing to do; since it reserves for authority the right to appeal to the sword."
 "Nowhere do the Gospels say, as the peace propagandists falsely assert, that peace has precedence before war. In the light of the Gospel the fable of eternal peace appears as a superstition. The Gospel has in the whole course of the history of the world never represented war as anything but an inevitable fact."
 "The present war, then, does not mark the collapse of Christian order of the world. When the Gospels say: 'If thou art smitten on the right cheek give the offender also the left cheek,' they do not mean it in the sense that if somebody wishes to take from thee, East Prussia to give him also West Prussia."

FARMER KILLED WOMAN
 A TRAGEDY NEAR BROCKVILLE ON WEDNESDAY MORNING.
 Grand Kibborn Pulled Shotgun On Mrs. James White, Who Was Moving Out of His House.
 Brockville, March 25.—A terrible tragedy occurred yesterday morning a short distance north-west of this town when Robert Kibborn, a well-known and middle-aged farmer, shot and killed Mrs. James White, a resident of the same locality for many years.
 The White family and Kibborn occupied the same house, Kibborn being the owner. The White family were moving out when the tragedy occurred. The elder White was outside loading some furniture on a wagon. His son was doing some chores, leaving Mrs. White, her daughter and Kibborn in the house. As Mrs. White was passing from one room she came across Kibborn with a shotgun in his hand. Immediately there was a report and Mrs. White fell to the floor with the contents of a shell in her abdomen.
 Kibborn, who was arrested later, says he did not know the gun was loaded or that there was such a thing as a shell in the house. He bore no malice or ill-will towards the Whites, he states.
 Mrs. Male, daughter of Mrs. White, the only eye witness of the affair outside of Kibborn, says that her mother and Kibborn had been having some words. Suddenly, she says, Kibborn appeared from his part of the house, aiming the gun at her mother, pulled the trigger.
 Mrs. Male says Kibborn returned to his room. When her brother, Jonas, came in, Kibborn threatened him. He wrested the gun from the assailant and locked him in his room. Mrs. Male after the shooting that Kibborn said he was going to shoot the old man, meaning her father.
 The late Mrs. White was about sixty-five years of age. She was born and resided in Elizabethtown township all her life.

FARMERS TO GET BINDER FOR THEIR WHEAT CROP
 Money To Finance Movement Of Sisal Will Be Taken To Mexico By American Warship.
 Washington, March 25.—An American warship will take to Yucatan money to finance the movement of Mexico's sisal hemp crop, needed to make twine for binding the enormous wheat crop to be raised by farmers of the United States this year. The money will be advanced to the hemp growers, and is in vaults in Galveston, Tex., but until to-day no safe means of getting it to Mexico had been found.
 Secretary Daniels agreed to permit the use of a warship for the purpose after hearing a statement by Edward C. Heidrich, jr., of Peoria, Ill., representing the sisal purchasers, who outlined the difficulties that had been encountered. It is probable that a gunboat or destroyer now in Southern waters will transport the money.
 Discussing the Mexican situation generally to-day, Secretary Bryan commented on conditions with a reiteration of the declaration that recognition of any faction had not been considered by this government. He spoke hopefully of the plans and arrangements for an official expression of regret by the Zapata Government for the murder of an American citizen, John B. McManus, in Mexico City.
