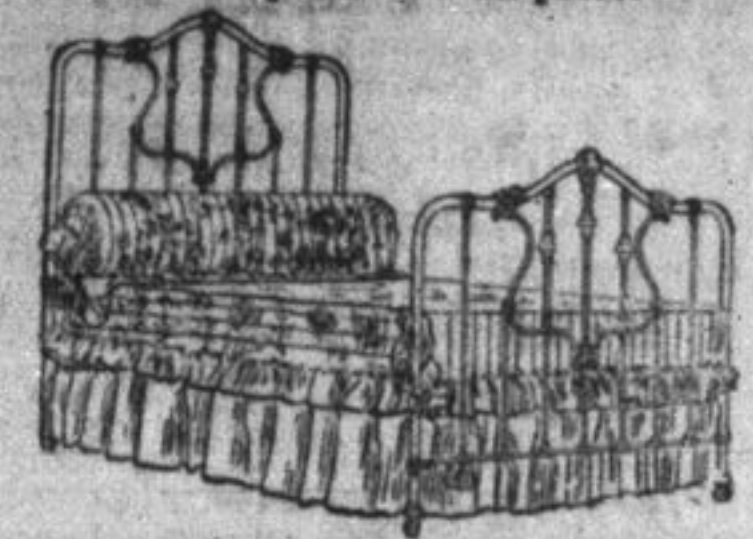

HAD TO PAY A FINE

TWO MEN WHO WENT TO SLEEP IN STABLE FRIDAY.

Campbell and Connell are the two men who went to James Swift's stable, William street, on Friday afternoon, and made themselves at home, and had to be removed to the police cells by Constables Timperman and Naylon. They were very drunk and when taken in charge by the police wanted to fight.

They admitted being drunk, and the magistrate put a fine of \$1 and costs on each, and as their funds are low they will have to go to jail for ten days.

Norman Fraser, a stranger, fell into the hands of the police on Friday night, on a charge of drunkenness. He said he came down from Cobourg to join the Overseas Battalion.

He made a tour of the hotels instead of going to military headquarters, and it was not very long before the police had a call for him. He had the money to pay his fine, so he still has a chance to enlist.

After dinner on Friday afternoon he retired to his bed and slept peacefully away. He was found dead by his wife.

The late Mr. King was born at Enfield Lock, England, thirty-four years ago, and came to Canada in 1906. In religion he was an Anglican, and a member of St. Paul's church. To mourn his loss there are a wife and two sons, Leslie and Edward.

The funeral will be on Monday morning at ten o'clock, from the Y.M.C.A., to Cataract cemetery, Canon W. F. Fitzgerald will officiate.
