

KILLED BY SHRAPNEL

THOMAS McMAHON, A FORMER KINGSTON RESIDENT,

Met Death With the Princess Patricias-Two Other Brothers Have Been Killed.

Thomas McMahon, Regina, formerly of Kingston, was killed in battle in France. He was a British Reservist and joined the Princess Patricias last August.

The deceased came from Ireland to Canada eight years ago, and resided with his half-brother, William Morrison, 94 Rideau street. Recently he wrote Mr. Morrison stating that two of his brothers had already been killed in the war, William McMahon, with the Irish Fusiliers having met death by shrapnel, and Joseph Mc-Mahon meeting his end on one of the

The deceased was born in County Armagh, Ireland, and was an Anglican in religion. He was also high up in the Orange Lodge. Three sisters reside in Ireland.
