MERCHANT SUMMONED JAMES CAMPBELL DEAD

RESIDED IN PORTSMOUTH OVER FORTY YEARS.

FOUND GUILTY OF TECHNICAL BREACH OF BY-LAW.

Case Against D. S. Collier Heard in Police Court on Monday Morning—No Penalty Imposed by Magistrate.

D. S. Collier, gent's furnisher, 214 Princess street, was charged in the police court, on Monday morning, with a violation of the closing by-law in having had his store open between the hours of 6.30 p.m. and 5 a.m. After the hearing of the evidence in the case, Magistrate Farrell stated that the accused was guilty of a technical breach of the by-law, but that under the circumstances he did not desire to impose a fine, believing that there had been no intention of violating the by-law. D. A. Givens, City Solicitor, did not press for a fine.

The accused pleaded "not guilty" to the charge through his counsel, T. J. Higgins.

Constable Samuel Arniel, who laid the charge, stated that on Tuesday evening last, about 8.45 o'clock, he noticed the lights burning in Mr. Collier's store, and on looking in saw the clerk, Evans Beaupre, and two men. The door was locked. Beaupre came to the door and witness said to him, "I understand you are doing business after hours." At this Beaupre replied "It was measuring a man for a suit of clothes."

Clerk Beaupre told how the men had happened to be in the store. They had gone there in order to get measured. At noon the same day they had been at the store, selected their cloth, but did not have time to get measured, as they only had an hour at noon from their work. As they could not wait, it was arranged that they should call at the store at night. There had been no sale of goods, and the actual measuring was all that had been done on this occasion.

Mr. Collier corroborated the evidence of his clerk.

Mr. Rigney held that the store had been kept closed within the meaning of the by-law.

"It was he not doing business in taking the measurements for the suits?" asked the magistrate.

The magistrate added that he would have to find the accused guilty of a technical breach of the by-law, but he did not care to impose a fine, as he did not think from the facts of the case that there was any intention on the part of the store to violate the by-law.

"Nor do I," remarked D. A. Givens. "He did something any other merchant tailor might do."



DEAN STARR PREACHED.

Sermon in St. George's Cathedral On War Problems.

Dr. Starr, Dean of Ontario, preached on "The War Problem as the last in his Lent series on "Problems of the Present Day." He took as a text "Hosannah! Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord," and pictured the influence of the mailed fist in gaining world supremacy, as compared with that of the "Man of Nazareth," welcomed on Palm Sunday, whose sceptre was the Cross. History has shown that it was the hand of the "mail prints" that had thrown down the gauntlet to Brute Force in its march down the ages.

The Dean then traced the attempts at world supremacy, from the days of Cyrus the Persian to the German Kaiser of to-day and how the principles of the Christ had gradually influenced the enduring nations. The reason was that love and not brute force was Christ's method of conquest. His warfare was not to subdue men but to bring them to their best. His service while it controlled men and demanded strong allegiance, was "perfect freedom."

It was a mistake to think war incompatible with Christianity. Christ had to meet men on their own level, but so was an accused thing but so was the cross, yet from the cross came man's redemption, not from the curse of war, God could and would bring the nations which stood for Christ's principles, onward toward the better day.

The Dean pictured the spite diabolism which had called forth the Allies were not fighting for world power, but the vindication of rights and true democracy. Such men and such nations would be welcomed with a "Hosannah! Blessed is he Lord."

KILLED BY SHRAPNEL

THOMAS McMAHON, A FORMER KINGSTON RESIDENT.

Met Death With the Princess Patricia's—Two Other Brothers Have Been Killed.

Thomas McMahon Regina, formerly of Kingston, was killed in battle in France. He was a British Reservist and joined the Princess Patricia's last August.

The deceased came from Ireland to Canada eight years ago, and resided with his half-brother, William Morrison, 94 Rideau street. Recently he wrote Mr. Morrison stating that two of his brothers had already been killed in the war, William McMahon, with the Irish Fusiliers having met death by shrapnel, and Joseph McMahon meeting his end on one of the ill-fated British men-of-war.

The telegram received by Mr. Morrison on Sunday stated that a shrapnel wound was the cause of death to the third brother. William Fodden, a son of William Fodden, bandmaster of the 14th P. W. O. Rifles, was in the same trench where Mr. McMahon was killed.

A week ago a post card and letter were received by Mr. Morrison from Mr. McMahon, stating that everything was well. He expressed the wish that he would meet Mr. Morrison's son, William (21st Battalion), in the trenches.

The deceased was born in County Armagh, Ireland, and was an Anglican in religion. He was also high up in the Orange Lodge. Three sisters reside in Ireland.
