

VOICE OF THE PULPIT

21ST BATTALION PRESBYTERIANS AT CHALMERS.

A Sacred Recital in Sydenham Street Methodist Church After the Sunday Evening Service.

In Chalmers Church on Sunday morning Rev. Dr. Macgillivray preached a very inspiring sermon on the text: "Righteousness exalted a nation; Proverbs xiv, 24. In concluding, he paid a tribute to the following words of the Presbyterian soldiers of the 21st Battalion who were present:

"We are happy to have the Presbyterian members of the 21st Regiment with us in public worship. There is not a more interesting and stirring sight in the city than the regiment at drill or on parade, nor a better fellowship, so far as I know the men, and you are heartily welcome to the best we have here.

"When you reach the front and step into the firing line you will find the Presbyterian tradition and Presbyterian ideal most helpful in giving you strength or determination to do your duty to the full.

"But you will not only cherish without stain a great inherited tradition and ideal, come down to you from Puritan and Covenanters, you will also create a new and worthy tradition for yourselves among your own people, among the Allies by whose side you are soon to stand for righteousness and humanity, and even among the enemy who will find Canadians, the bravest of the brave in the throes of battle, and also the wholesomest of men, the gentlest, the most chivalrous to the prisoner, the wounded enemy who may fall into your hands, and to the aged women and children among the non-combatants.

"You will compel the enemy to pay ungrudging respect to the irresistible gallantry and the embellished morale of the 21st Canadians. The Lord bless you and keep you; the Lord make his face to shine upon you and be gracious unto you; the Lord lift up the light of His countenance upon you and

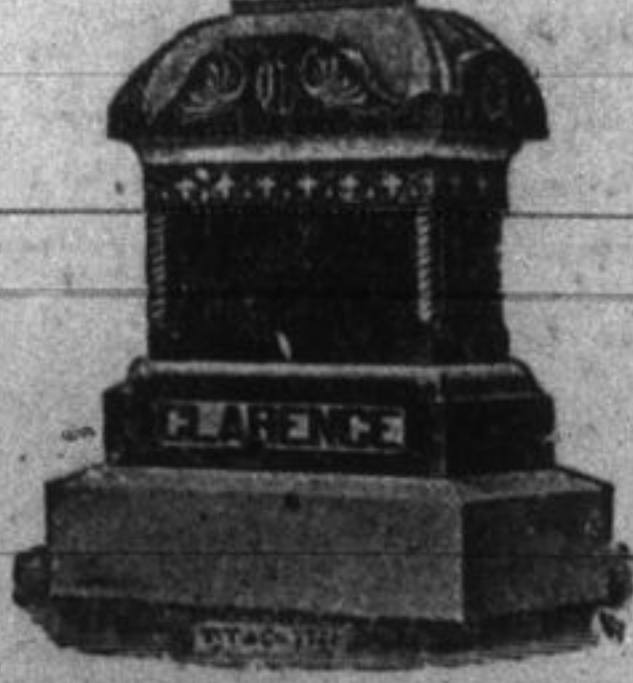

Held Their Annual Meeting on Saturday Afternoon.

The annual meeting of the Holstein Breeders' Association was held in the Windsor Hotel on Saturday afternoon, and was presided over by Lieut.-Col. F. Ferguson, Inverary. In addition to two very interesting addresses given by R. S. Stevenson, Ancaster, and W. Lucas, Napane, the election of officers and directors was carried out.

Mr. Stevenson's talk dwelt chiefly upon Holstein cattle and the improvement of their breed by using high-class bulls. The testing of cows was also a point of interest in his discourse.

LEGISLATURE ESTIMATES.

Grants To Kingston Institutions and Frontenac Roads. The estimates of the Ontario Legislature for the fiscal year ending October 31, 1915, contains these grants to Kingston institutions and Frontenac roads:

- Rockwood Asylum—Salaries, \$53,770 and expenses \$85,690, both amounts the same as last year; alterations and additions, \$6,500. Queen's University—School of Mining maintenance, \$24,500; School of Mining for equipment, \$7,500; special grant to School of Mining, \$5,000; grant to Medical College, \$10,000; Medical Laboratory, \$1,000; Faculty of Education, \$12,000. Kingston Historical Society, \$100. Portsmouth Public School, \$100. The following are among the Supplementary Estimates: To provide for farmer at Rockwood Hospital for the insane, \$100; allowance for extra services to E. W. Hoag, acting bursar at Rockwood, \$300. Public Works—Boundary Creek bridge, grant to Kennebec, \$200; Buckshot Creek bridge, grant to Clarendon, \$200; Calabogie bridge accounts, \$110; Scot River bridge, grant to Kaladar, \$300; Admington Road, Cloyne to Kaladar, \$100; Bedford Mills Road, \$150; Bedford, Loughboro to Fermoyn village, \$150; Bedford, Parham and Westport road, \$150; Bedford, Fermoyn to Desert Lake, \$200; Fifth Dept., Tamworth to Parham, \$150; Frontenac and Scotchton line, \$150; Lavant to Folger, \$200; Loughboro, Elk Lake and 8th concession road, \$150; Loughboro and Bedford Road, 8th to 12th concession, of Loughboro; \$150; Palmerston and Lavant and Snow Road, \$400; Pembroke Townships, \$500; Perth Road bridge, \$100; Perth Road between Raymond Corners and Duck Lake bridge, \$200; Plevna and Ompah, \$250.

CHAPLAINS' HEROIC WORK.

They Are Given Army Ranking, But No Titles.

Bishop Taylor Smith, Chaplain-General of the Forces, who has just returned to England after a visit to the front, received from Sir John French, at headquarters, a fine testimonial to the work of army chaplains, both at the base and where the bullets fly.

Chaplains are variously attached to field ambulances and divisional headquarters, and are divided into four classes, the uppermost ranking as colonels and the fourth class as captains. They do not use a title of military rank, however. The chaplain-general ranks as major-general, his brigadier with the British expeditionary force being Dr. Timmins (Presbyterian). Heavy responsibilities devolve upon the senior chaplain, the Rev. E. G. F. Macpherson, who has gone to the front on a round of inspection of the chaplains.

Mr. Macpherson (who went through the siege of Ladysmith, together with the Rev. J. G. Tuckey, the next chaplain in precedence at the front) was in the retreat from Mons, the fighting along the Aisne, and the fiercest battle of modern times, the long-drawn-out struggle before Ypres.
