Still More Service.

Capt. J. C. Fletcher, of the Twenty-Sixth Middlesex Regiment, has just received from Ottawa a colonial auxiliary forces long service medal. Capt. Fletcher, whose home is on Madison avenue, London, has completed twenty-four years of service in the army. He entered military life in 1891, undergoing with the Oxford and Bucks Light Infantry, and transferred to the Twenty-Sixth Middlesex Regiment with which he has since been connected, steadily rising till he obtained his captaincy. His courses of instruction for the various ranks which he has held have been taken at the Royal Military College, from which he has received seven certificates, among them being a military drill instructor's certificate.

Badly Frost-bitten Feet.

Private C. H. Craig, of Calgary, to whom belongs the distinction of being the first and only Canadian to be received into the newly-equipped Canadian military hospital at Cliveden, was invalided back in consequence of badly frost-bitten feet. In common with about half his company, he said that he occupied a trench waist deep in water and slush almost continually from the first week in January, with the result that when severe frost set in, about the middle of January, more than a dozen of them succumbed to the frost. Craig has since been at the hospital base in France, where, he says, several of the Princess Pats are still being treated. Some of the men are rather seriously wounded, but on the other hand, he had learned that in the majority of cases the Patricia's wounded will soon be able to take their places at the front.

German Officer's Brutality.

The Hague, March 31.—Interned at his own request is the fate of a German soldier posted on the Dutch frontier near Sluis. The man, while on duty, was found by his officer engaged in the brutal practice of assaulting the time of day with a pretty Belgian girl on the other side of the roadway which marked the frontier. Instead of placing him under arrest the officer assaulted the man, striking him with his fist and the flat of his sword. The sentry waited till the officer had disappeared, and then throwing down his rifle, he crossed the frontier and asked to be arrested. He was interned at one of the Dutch concentration camps.

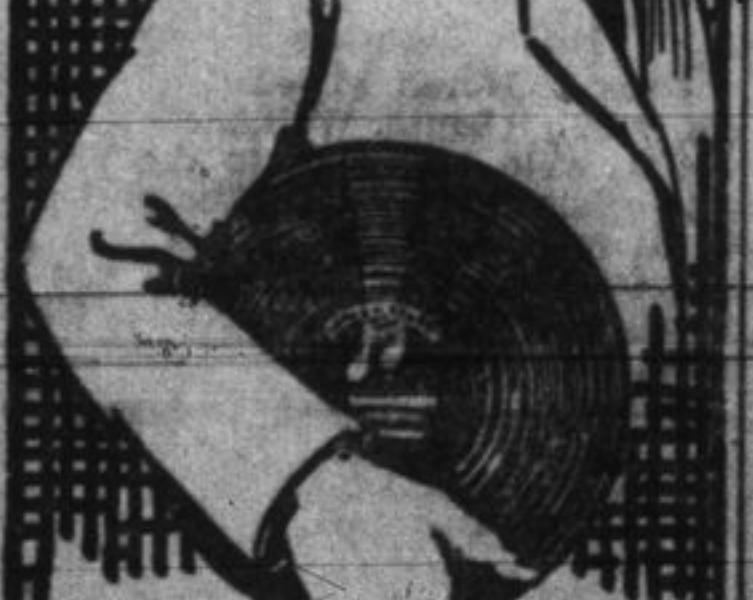
