WHEN SMOKE FROM RUBBISH. PILE FILLED IT

People at 214 Division Street Had Close Call-Firemen Carried a Child Down a Ladder to Safety.

Several people living in the home S. H. Miller, 214 Division street, had a close call from being suffocated late on Wednesday night, when smoke from a pile of rubbish, which caught fire near the back door, entered the house. The inmates had to make a hurried exit.

Captain Stratford and Fireman Lutz carried a child out of a bed room and down a ladder to safety.

The firemen received a telephone call at twelve minutes after 11 o'clock, and when they arrived on the acene they found the house . filled with smoke, so dense that a herson could hardly find his way about the place. Men and women evere making their way out of the house as fast as they could, and some were very scantily dressed.

The firemen first directed their attention to getting all the inmates out. Capt Stratford found that there was a child in one of the rooms, who was unable to get out without assistance, and he hurried and made the rescue, passing the little one on to Fireman Lutz, who came down the ladder. The other people were able to get out unattended.
