Rev. A. H. Greer, formerly of St. Mark's Church, Barrie, and at the Front as Chaplain—Private Ramsey Recovered From Wounds.

"There is a great scramble for letters when the Canadian mail arrives," says Private Robert Wormington, with the 4th Highlanders Company in France, in a letter to his sister, Mrs. George Medley, Barrie. "There are many disappointed faces when letters do not come."

Private Wormington says that he has been in the trenches, and that everything is progressing nicely. "I have seen a few of them," he adds, meaning Germans, "and they are a beaten bunch from the word go. They are down-hearted and tired." The writer states that he met Rev. A. H. Greer, who is at the front as a chaplain. Mr. Greer was formerly rector of St. Mark's church, at Barrie, and was a well-known member of the Kingston Rifle Association. Private Wormington was a member of his Sunday school class. Mr. Greer sent greetings to his many friends in Kingston and Barrie.

Pte. William Ramsay Recovered.
On Wednesday afternoon John Ramsay, 43 Division street, father of Pte. William Ramsay, the Kingstonian who was wounded in France, received a telegram stating that he had been discharged from the hospital where he was under Lieut.-Col. A. E. Ross' care. He will be back on the firing line again.

RUSHED FROM HOUSE

WHEN SMOKE FROM RUBBISH PILE FILLED IT

People at 214 Division Street Had Close Call—Firemen Carried a Child Down a Ladder to Safety.

Several people living in the home of S. H. Miller, 214 Division street, had a close call from being suffocated late on Wednesday night, when smoke from a pile of rubbish, which caught fire near the back door, entered the house. The inmates had to make a hurried exit.

Captain Stratford and Fireman Lutz carried a child out of a bed room and down a ladder to safety.

The firemen received a telephone call at twelve minutes after 11 o'clock, and when they arrived on the scene they found the house filled with smoke, so dense that a person could hardly find his way about the place. Men and women were making their way out of the house as fast as they could, and some were very scantily dressed.

The firemen first directed their attention to getting all the inmates out. Captain Stratford found that there was a child in one of the rooms, who was unable to get out without assistance, and he hurried and made the rescue, passing the little one on to Fireman Lutz, who came down the ladder. The other people were able to get out unattended.

In her attempt to put out the fire, Mrs. Miller had her hair singed. Although the hour was late quite a large crowd of people was attracted to the scene.

The fire in the rubbish heap was very easily extinguished, and there was damage done to property.

CASES TO BE HEARD.

By Judge Lovell at County Court Next Tuesday.

The docket of civil cases entered for trial at the non-jury sittings of the County Court before Judge Madden on Tuesday is as follows:

B. F. Dettlor, Arden, vs. Henry Hannah, Napanee. For agent's commission for selling defendant's farm. The defendant denies that he employed the plaintiff.

Ernest R. Beckwith vs. W. J. Baker for balance due for architect's fees and for materials. The defendant claims delay in completion of building and losses caused by such delay.

John Bennett vs. the Corporation of the Township of Pittsburg for a declaration that \$79.55 in a tax paid be taken off the collector's roll. The defendant claims that the amount is legally charged against the plaintiff.

Minerva E. Hayes, Arden, et al vs. George Boomhower for \$200 damages for cutting timber and wood belonging to the plaintiff and committing other trespasses. The defendant claims he has a right to cut and remove the timber.

F. B. McCurdy vs. A. C. Knapp for \$125.22 for purchase of cotton and broker's commission. The defendant claims that the plaintiff had no instructions to buy the cotton.
