## IN MILITARY CIRCLES

LIEUT. KENNETH WILLIAMS ATTACHED TO 39TH BATTALION.

As Supply Officer—Time Gun at Fort Henry in Excellent Condition—A. S. A. Smoker Thursday Night.

"Ken" Williams the well-known rugby player, has received a commission in the Army Service Corps, and has been transferred to the 39th Battalion at Belleville where he will be supply officer, succeeding Capt. J. Welch. Lieut. Williams attended a class a few weeks ago in Ottawa and qualified with high honors.

The honorary members of the Sergeants Mess of the R. C. H. A. are cordially invited to the farewell smoker to the N. C. O's of the Royal School of Artillery on Thursday night.

The third Royal School of Artillery closed on Thursday, and on Friday the officers will leave for their homes in different parts of the Dominion. Several applications have been received for entrance to the fourth course that opens on April 26th.

The time-gun at Fort Henry has been examined by Lieut. Chevie and found in excellent condition. The examinations are conducted periodically. This gun was first issued in 1898.

"A" and "B" sub-sections of "C" Battery, R. C. H. A., will play baseball with "C" and "D" sub-sections on Tete de Pont Barracks square on Friday afternoon.

Three more men have been accepted for No. 5 Stationary Hospital, (Queen's). The accepted men are all being issued with uniforms and were drilled on the lower campus on Thursday morning. There are several qualified officers in the ranks, and they are conducting the drills.

Six boxes of books arrived in the city on Thursday morning for the Germans at Fort Henry. The books are first read by one who understands the Teuton language and then handed over to the librarian at the fort. They are sent here by the German Embassy at Washington.

W. Nickle son of W. F. Nickle, M.P., has applied for membership in the Queen's platoon of the 35th Overseas Battalion.

A medical enquiry into the cases of the Peterboro men who were sent back from Belleville and Ottawa as medically unfit was conducted at the Peterboro Armouries on Wednesday afternoon by Lieut.-Col. H. R. Duff, A. D. M. S.

The investigation at Lindsay resulted in a number of the men rejected at Belleville being declared medically unfit by the Board, and similar results are expected at Peterboro although the percentage of 57th men sent back was very small.
