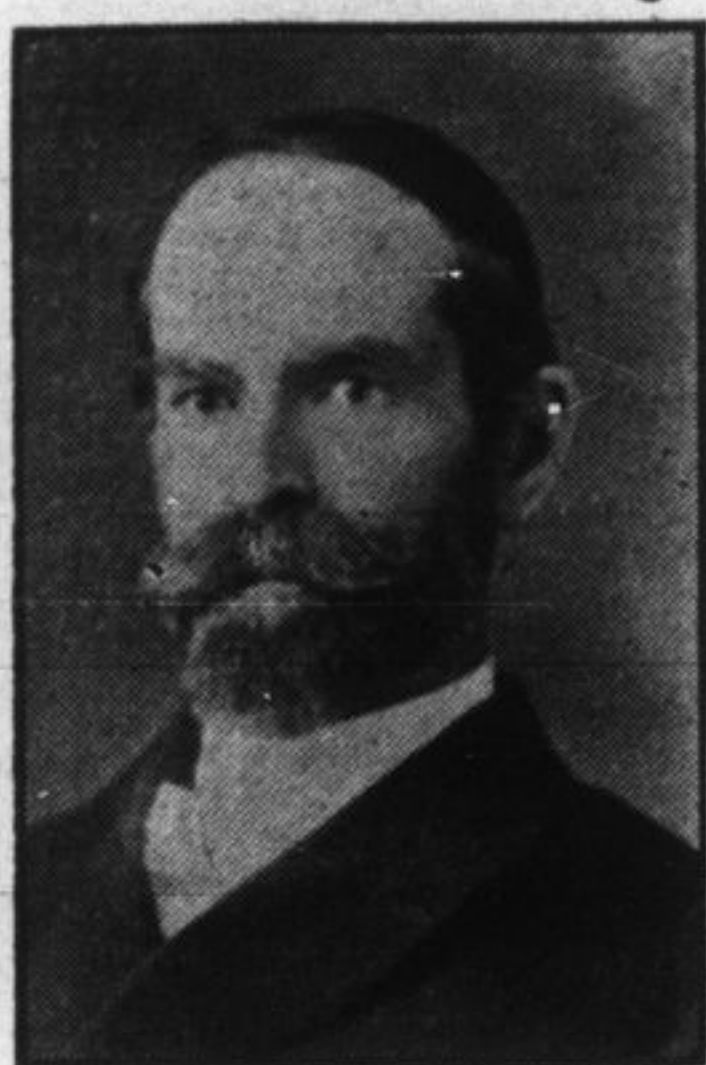


"Easter Our Inspiration"

The gloom, the depression, the hopelessness which weighed upon those who stood by the cross of our blessed Redeemer as He yielded up His spirit, has forever passed away. Christ has triumphed over the marshalled opposition of His foes.



The enemies of Christ under the leadership of Satan gloated over their supposed triumph, when they had secured Christ by betrayal, had succeeded in His arrest, and had overruled Pilate to give sentence that He should be crucified. 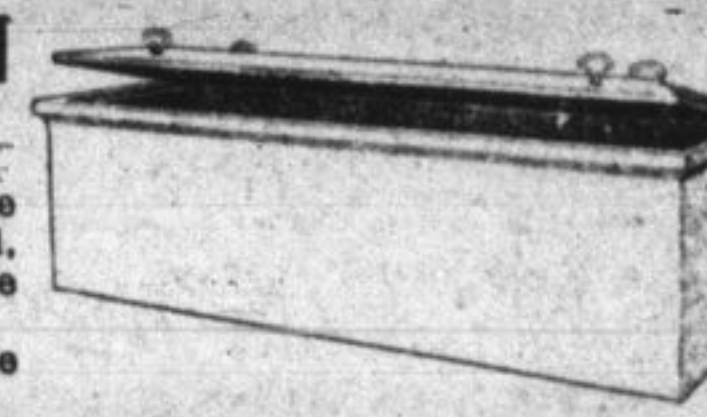

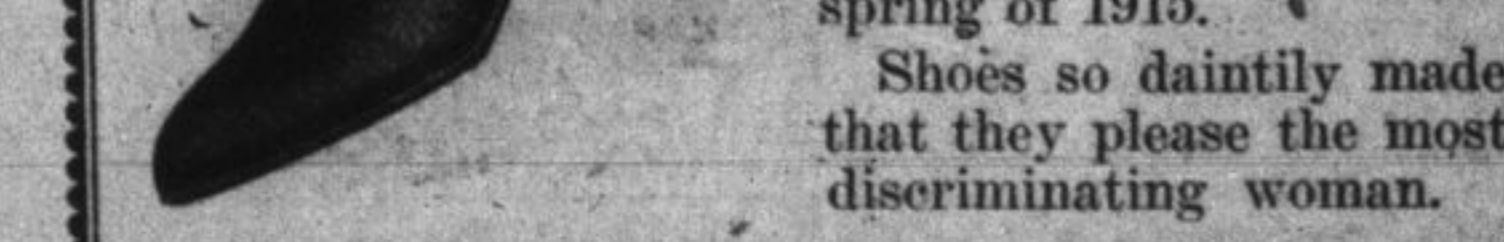
