### Worth Remembering.

To clean white leather belts, rub well with powdered borax, using a piece of white flannel, then finish with benzine.

When cleaning lace, rub from the salvage side and it will not put out of shape.

If you find yourself without soap in the kitchen a little lemon juice will cut the grease when washing dishes.

It is not necessary to black the range every day. Rub quickly while hot, with a bit of paraffin wax, then wipe with an old cloth.

Onions will fry more readily if dipped in milk.

Half a pound each of soft soap, sand and whiting simmered gently in a pint of water for half an hour and kept in a jar is handy for scrubbing boards and pans.

If your fur neckpiece has become

greasy, it may be cleaned with ether, not touching the felt, then rubbed with hot bran or cornmeal.
