The Newest Notes of Science

A Frenchman has invented a flexible steering wheel shaft for automobiles. The United States produce more copper than all the rest of the world. A man's lungs require twice as much air when he is walking as when resting quietly. New South Wales is said to contain more kinds of flowering plants than all Europe. A French wood preservation method consists of forcing a solution of ten per cent borax and five per cent rosin into timber by electricity. To foil milk thieves two Philadelphia inventors have patented a receptacle that automatically closes and locks itself when a bottle is placed in it. The bottom of an Iowa inventor's oil can is compressed in the usual way, but inside it is a spring to return the bottom to its original position. Spain by royal order has made the annual celebration of arbor day obligatory, a portion of the expense of tree planting to be borne by municipalities. To protect a chauffeur's eyes from glaring headlights there has been invented an amber glass shield which can be swung into position for use at night. A gutter cleaning machine has been patented, consisting of a set of wheels to be pushed along a curb, attached to which are two scrapers to do the work. An electrically operated machine has been invented by a Russian naval officer for writing messages in code and deciphering such messages when received. So that wires can be twisted together with one hand, pliers have been patented with a wing cut to hold the jaws together after they have gripped the wires. A British merchant marine has nearly doubled in carrying power in twenty years, and now numbers about 31,000 vessels of approximately 47,000,000 tons capacity. It has been estimated by a Berlin scientist that the commercial value of electricity in a flash of lighting lasting one thousandth of a second is 29 cents. An electric lamp stand holding a standard socket that has been patented by a Rhode Island inventor is stamped out of sheet metal and can be folded flat when idle. A telephone directory that will hold 300 names and which consists of celluloid leaves that can be fastened around the mouthpiece of a transmitter has been patented. The industry encouraged by the Government, Tunis is now producing more than 10,000,000 gallons of olive oil a year and expects in a few years more than to double the amount. A cubic mile of river water weighs about 4,205,650 tons and carries in solution an average of 420,000 tons of solids. Much like a painter's jack is a seat patented by a Pennsylvania woman for use of cleaners. It has been estimated by engineers that one waterfall in Iceland can be made to produce 60,000 horsepower and another 50,000. Cottonseed oil production of the United States is now more than 200,000,000 gallons a year, or five times as much as in 1890.

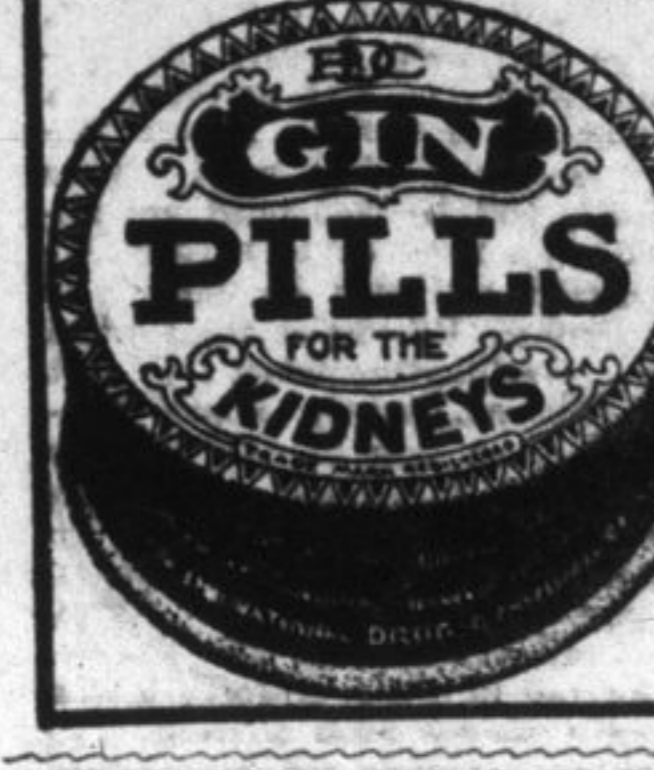
