COMMISSION IS ASKED

FOR THE SALE OF A FARM NEAR ARDEN.

Suit of B. F. Dettlor Against Henry Hannah Heard at Non-Jury Sitings of County Court Before Judge Madden.

Judge Madden, Napanee, is presiding at the non-jury sittings of the County Court, which opens on Tuesday afternoon. There are five cases booked for hearing.

The entire afternoon was taken up in the hearing of the case of B. F. Dettlor, Arden, vs. Henry Smith, of the same place, in which the plaintiff made a claim for agent's commission for the sale of the defendant's farm near Arden. The defence claimed that the plaintiff was not employed to sell the farm. After hearing evidence, the court reserved decision. W. S. Herrington, Napanee, appeared for the plaintiff and T. J. Rigney for the defence.

In the witness box, the plaintiff swore that he made a bargain with Hannah, whereby he would have a commission, which would consist of anything over the sum of \$2,500. He claimed that the sale was brought about as a result of his work. Albert Gaylord, Arden, formerly of Saskatoon, was the purchaser, the deal being made by his wife, who came here from the west for the purpose of looking over the farm and making a deal for it. It was satisfactory, and they swore that they had been asked to buy the property by Dettlor, who had written to them about the farm. Mrs. Gaylord told of making the trip east to see the farm. William Newton and C. W. Scott, Arden, were witnesses for the plaintiff regarding the deal.

Hannah swore that there was no agreement between him and Dettlor regarding a commission and claimed that his entire dealings had been with Mrs. Gaylord. His wife and William McGregor, Arden, testified in his behalf.

In his argument, Mr. Rigney declared that the plaintiff had not been able to prove that there had been any contract entered into relative to a commission.

"The only evidence we have is that of Dettlor sending three letters to the Gaylords," said Mr. Rigney, "and they are not produced in court. I hold that the attempt made to establish a contract has failed."

Mr. Herrington said Mrs. Gaylord never made the trip from the west to see the farm, and it is not for the letters she received from Mr. Dettlor asking her to make the purchase. At any rate, the writing of the letters was not the all-important fact. The question was as to whether Dettlor was the real cause of the sale going through. He held that he had been the cause, that a contract had been entered into between the two parties, and that as a result of the sale, Dettlor was entitled to his commission.
