When the war broke out, Capt. Carson was in India, and assisted in the mobilization of the company. Later he was ordered back to England, where he has since been in command of the 130th Company Royal Engineers. He expects to take his company to the front for the spring campaign.

Oilmann, Oshawa; Mrs. Katie Hunt, Mrs. Augustus Thompson, Mrs. Henry Ormston, all of this city; Miss Lucy McCarey residing at home.

On Friday morning at 9.30 o'clock the remains will be taken to St. Mary's Cathedral, where a solemn requiem mass will be sung by Rev. Father A. J. Hanley. The remains will then be placed in St. Mary's vault and later removed to St. Barnabas cemetery, Brewer's Mills, where interment will take place.

The Late Mrs. John Dunbar.

On Wednesday morning at 10.30 o'clock Susanna Stewart, wife of John Dunbar of this city passed to rest at the age of sixty-nine years. The deceased was born in Kingston and was a life-long resident of the city where she made the acquaintance of a large number of friends. During her attendance she was as punctual as the clock and when anything of importance was deemed necessary no other person was more active than Mrs. Dunbar in helping.
